NORTHEASTERN BOUNDARY.

The annexed Report of the Commissioners appointed by the President of the United States, under the Act of 20th July last, for the purpose of exploring and surveying the Boundary Line between the States of Maine, New Brunswick, and the British Provinces, was submitted to Congress on the 9th instant, referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations, and ordered to be printed.

REPORT, &c.
New-York, Jan. 6, 1841.

Sir.—The Commissioners having assembled in this City, in conformity with your orders under date of 20th July, beg leave respectfully to report— That the extent of country, and the great length of the boundary line, have rendered it impossible to have completed the task assigned them within the period of a year. In addition to this, the physical impossibility, the want of the necessary resources, and the want of the necessary funds, have rendered it necessary to make a great progress. The law under which they have acted, was passed at the last session of the Legislature, and although no delay took place in the appointment of commissioners, the organization of the Commission was not effected, in consequence of the resignation of one of the commissioners and the agent to Congress of their nomination. The commissioners, acting under these disadvantages, have done all that lay in their power to accomplish the great object, and the extent of work, and have obtained many results, which cannot be important in the examination of the vexed and important question which has been presented to the Legislature, but after having fully and maturely considered the subject, and the changed results of their respective operations, they have come to the conclusion that it would be better to suspend the further progress of the survey, until a more favorable opportunity should present itself.

The meridian line of the St. Croix has not been carried to a distance of more than fifty miles from the monument at the source of that river; and the operations of the other commissioners, although they have covered a wide extent of country, have fallen far short of the duty assigned them, namely, that of exploration; while, in the particular, actual surveys will be necessary for the purpose of presenting the question in such form to the Legislature, as will enable it to make a decision upon comparative observations, and to be satisfied, by this example, against committing a like error. 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over which it would have been possible to convey them when fully loaded. For want of a guide, a branch more westerly than that which issues from the Lake was entered. One of the boats was therefore sent on, to the westward, to await the return of the engineers despatched to the meridian line. The stores, which were all that remained, were brought up, in the state of the waters, were now found to be in a very low stage, and of committing the party to the unexplored country, which must intervene before the return of the engineers, would have been attended to exhaust them. The commissioner, therefore, resolved to proceed across the country, with no other guides than the engineers, and the laws of provisions. The third detachment reached their station on Green River mountain, on the 13th September, and continued there until the 12th October. A full set of magnetic observations was made; the latitude was determined by a very accurate method, well detailed approximately, by some lunar observations.

The fourth detachment, after depositing the stores, proceeded on to the Lake, to the point where they were to be met by the party in charge of the British commissary. The party who politely undertook the care of them, ascended the Tulladi, and taking his northern branch, reached the point where the British commissary would himself severely, and was rendered unfit for duty.
