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Although the number of cases that have proved fatal have been large, yet considering the mortality among immigrants, this season, and other parts, particularly that the reports that were published from time to time of the deaths at Partridge Island, have been greatly exaggerated; and for the purpose of preventing such gross misapprehensions, we shall endeavor to procure and publish further official reports for the time to come.

With respect to the supplies presented to the vessels on shore, at Quarantine, many equally unfounded reports have been circulated. Under the circumstances, the wants of our unfortunate people have been attended to, perhaps, as could be expected. The Health Officer, (Dr. G. J. Harding) is well known, has had a most arduous and responsible duty to perform, even with the assistance of two medical practitioners, Dr. W. S. Harding and Dr. Collins; but these gentlemen being both attacked with fever soon after they proceeded to the Island, the whole of the Medical Department has been for the most part been conducted by Dr. G. J. Harding alone. His orders for the necessary supplies for the sick have been promptly supplied by the proper authorities, and no more praise can be awarded to His Worship the Mayor and Mr. Alderman Smith for their active personal exertions in the cause of suffering humanity. Bonds have been secured, and the agents of the several vessels for the supply of provisions for the healthy, well kept at the Station for observation and inspection.

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Reports of impositions upon the immigrants by the boatman in the employ of the Corporation, have been circulated, but no case has been brought in to substantiate such a charge, and as they have conveyed a disrepute to the Corporation, we shall bear no more on this head, and that all those who will in their capacity of agents of the Corporation, be so many miserable beings who have found their way to our shores, this season, in search of a livelihood.

We publish the following report from the Alms House and Hospital, under the professional care of Doctors W. S. Harding and Dr. Collins, and as they are erroneous and prevailing statements respecting the mortality in it. We are authorized in stating that this mortality would be unusually small under ordinary circumstances, and that it is remarkably so, when we consider the condition of the numerous emigrants, suffering under fever in all its stages, who have been admitted into the establishment; the several vessels which have arrived during the season, have been 138 Emigrants, exclusive of the usual House Patients, under daily treatment for fever in its various stages, of whom only 100 have recovered.
