SAINT VINCENT'S PRESENTATION

Bishop Le Blanc, Chief Justice McKeown and A. Gordon Leavitt Officiated.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc was most felicitous in his remarks, when the pleasant duty fell to him to preside at the Alumnae Gold Medal to Miss Lillian Clarke, at the closing of the St. Vincent's High School, at the Convention of the same name, on Cliff street yesterday. His Lordship spoke most appreciatively of the chairman, Chief Justice McKeown, and of his position as head of the School Board. Words of warmest praise were offered in regard to the absent superintendent, Dr. H. S. Bridges and wishes expressed for his recovery.

Chief Justice McKeown had the pleasure of presenting the Parker silver medal to Miss Clarke and in his address he told the audience that it was the first time that he had been able to attend a closing exercise, in his official capacity as chairman of the school board. It was with great applause that he was received when he was introduced by Mrs. Lordship. The medal was for mathematics.

A Gordon Leavitt was called upon to present the Ellis Gold Medal for Mathematics, which he did in humorous style, to the delight of the young people and the audience. Miss Clarke was the recipient for the third time. As acting superintendent, Mr. Leavitt expressed regret for Dr. Bridges' absence, on account of illness. He wished all a Merry Christmas.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Dec. 22.—Henry Smith, of Tryon, P. E. I., has received word of the deaths of his two nephews, Richard Smith, 23, and his brother, Arthur, 21, of Round Valley, Onyo County, California, sons of I. Y. Smith. Both perished in the snows of the Sierra Mountains. They had left home on horse back to go to a lake four miles away.

Richard was lying rigid in death; Arthur was sitting up and still living. He smiled faintly at his rescuers and said: "Oh, you boys have come." These were his last words. He died next morning.

QUEENS COUNTY COOK SUGGUMBS

Eddison McLean Seized With Illness on Way from Lumber Camp.

Stampered, Dec. 22.—The sudden death of Eddison McLean, of Cumberland Bay, Queens County, which occurred here yesterday morning, was heard of with regret by the residents of this community.

Mr. McLean, who was acting as cook at a lumber camp of Kennedy and McLean, back of the village, was on his way out from the camp to spend Christmas at home when he was stricken and died in a few minutes.

According to the story of the men with him, Mr. McLean was in the best of health and on the way out ran a short distance to catch up to one of the tote teams. When very nearly to the clearing he complained of not feeling well and the men carried him into one of the Mooney sheds, but he expired before they reached the building.

A doctor was summoned but could do nothing as life was extinct. As it was impossible at the time to get in touch with the coroner, the attending physician gave a certificate of death from heart failure and ordered the removal of the body to the undertaking establishment of P. C. Slipp & Son, where it was prepared for burial.

Yesterday afternoon the body was sent to Fredericton on the Valley train and will be taken this morning on the C. P. R. to his late home at Cumberland Bay, where the funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon.

ENGINEER'S WIFE CHARGED WITH MURDER LIVED IN RICHIBUCTO

Mrs. William Connaughton Was Formerly Miss Sadie Thompson of That Place—Husband Also Belonged There and Visited Old Home Few Weeks Ago—John McKee, Slain Railroad Man, Probably Former Resident of St. John—Inquest Indicates Woman Was Unbalanced.

Through the publication in the Journal yesterday of an account of the murder of John McKee, a Canadian Pacific railroad engineer, at Chapleau, Ont., one week ago tonight, for which Mrs. Sadie Connaughton is held in the jail at Sudbury, Ont., the identity of the Connaughton family was disclosed. The family belongs to Richibucto.

When Richard O'Leary of the latter town, who was at the Royal hotel yesterday, read the account he immediately recognized the names. In fact William Connaughton, husband of the woman charged with shooting McKee, was in Richibucto on a visit only a few weeks ago. Connaughton is an engineer on the Canadian Pacific railroad and belongs to a family well known in Kent County twenty years ago. He is highly regarded, is well educated and considered an excellent engineer. He went to school with several men now residents of St. John, and later attended St. Joseph's University at Memramcook.

About sixteen years ago he married Miss Sadie Thompson, daughter of Roderick Thompson of Richibucto, she is now about forty years of age. The two left the province fifteen years ago for Ontario, where Connaughton entered the employ of the C. P. R., and was advanced to the first rank of engineers.

The couple took a house in Chapleau, a divisional point, the rear of the building facing the rear of the house of John McKee. The Connaughtons have a son fifteen years of age. A brother of Mrs. Connaughton has been an engineer on the Canadian National Railways for years.

It is possible that McKee was formerly a resident of St. John, as Thomas McKenna of 234 Rodney street, West St. John, a retired C. P. R. engineer, remembers a railroad man of that name on this division of the road. He left this province many years ago. McKee had been a widower for eight years. He leaves a son of seventeen and a daughter of fifteen.

SPECIAL TRAIN FOR LUMBERMEN

C. P. R. Runs Express to Take Men Home from Camps.

Fredericton, Dec. 22.—The Canadian National Railway put a special train this morning and 700 men came from the various logging camps along the line of the Edmundston-Moncton section of the system and dispersed at the various junction points to their homes for Christmas.

In addition the regular Quebec-St. John train also carried a large party of men from the logging camps.

A large portrait of the late Sir George H. Parkin, was presented today to Fredericton High School. The presentation was made on behalf of the School Board, by Dr. H. V. B. Bridges principal of the Provincial Normal School who for four years was a member of the teaching staff of the Fredericton Collegiate School, now the High School, while the deceased was headmaster.

The frame of the portrait bears a silver plate upon which is engraved "Sir George H. Parkin, K. C., M. G., 1846-1922. Head Master Collegiate School, 1872-1889."

Dr. Bridges gave many personal recollections of the late Sir George whom he as a boy knew, although he never had been a pupil under him. He also spoke of the outstanding qualities which made him a great teacher and later an empire figure through his efforts on behalf of imperial federation, the Rhodes Trust and the Allied cause during the great war.

There also was the presentation of the Lieut.-Governor's Medal for High School entrance to Maurice Boone, Dr. G. C. VanWart, of the School Board made the presentation.

TURKEYS GET HIM IN WRONG

Prince William Man Is Accused of Violating Fredericton Market Laws.

Fredericton, Dec. 22.—Robert Graham, an ex-councillor for the parish of Prince William and one of the leading turkey raisers in central New Brunswick, has been charged with a violation of the city by-laws relating to the marketing of poultry in the city market.

Information laid this morning charged ex-Councillor Graham with "offering for sale in the city market a turkey from which the crop or entrails and neck had not been removed as required by the city by-laws so made and provided."

The information was laid by Chief of Police Jones, following a dispute between a patrolman and the defendant Mr. Graham brought a large quantity of turkeys to the city this week and was offering them for sale when Officer Simcock says he warned him that to leave the heart, gizzard, neck, etc., in the turkeys constituted a violation of the by-law in respect to the marketing of poultry.

Mr. Graham continued to offer his turkeys for sale in the same condition after consulting with a lawyer, and the upshot of it was that he was finally served with papers as a result of the information laid.
