The dwelling house of R. Russell, Dartmouth, (Halifax), was destroyed by fire on Saturday last. The owner and family had been absent on a visit to Bermuda and returned home the evening after the fire. The property was only partially insured and the loss above insurance is put at \$4000.

Usually an excursion train leaves a few minutes late, but this morning's train left sharp on time and several parties were seen wending their way to the depot only to be disappointed, being too late.

The Canadian Pacific will run dining cars on their Halifax and Montreal train commencing June 24th. This will be a convenience that maritime province passenger have not experienced heretofore, and which will be greatly appreciated. On leaving Halifax at 7.50 a. m. local time, breakfast will be served which will enable passengers to eat this meal leisurely instead of in a hurry at home or at a hotel. Dinner and supper will also be served in this train arriving in Montreal 8.20 next a. m. To the train leaving Montreal 8.40 p. m., a dining car will be attached early next morning serving breakfast, dinner and supper arriving in Halifax same evening at 11.20.

SENT TO JAIL FOR TWO MONTHS.

William Lair, the young man who was caught assisting William Dougan to capture a horse to enable the latter to escape at St. Martin's on Friday last, was taken before Judge Forbes this morning under the speedy trials act. The authorities are after Dougan for criminal assault on a woman. Lair admitted the charge, but pleaded that he was compelled to do so by Dougan, who, he said, threatened to shoot if he did not.

Judge Forbes, in pronouncing sentence, gave him some excellent advice as to future conduct. He said he would have sent him to the Reformatory if he was not so old, but he would not send him to Dorchester, this being his first offence. Instead he would sentence him to two months in jail at hard labor.

Items of Interest.

Hon. J. C. Ward, treasurer and post master general of New Zealand, arrived at Montreal from London, where he had been floating a 3 1/2 per cent. loan of \$1,500,000 for improvements in the colony. He will interview the Ottawa ministers regarding the Pacific mail and cable matters and says public opinion in Australia is ripe for these enterprises.

The Gavana riots took place in Montreal forty-two years ago yesterday, when the 26th Cameronian regiment fired into a crowd, killing twenty-seven persons and wounding many more. Gavana, an Italian priest, was fulminating against the alleged errors of Rome.

In these days, when most of medical men are on the still hunt for miraculous cures, specifics in one or other form, it is easy to lose sight of, at least to fail to give sufficient attention to the matter of the cause or causes of disease and of the means of prevention as well as of the really scientific, because so often simple, measures calculated so to help nature as to enable her to successfully perform a cure.

We all remember how the profession ransacked the entire earth for some medication that should "cure" scurvy. No better illustration of what good old Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes declared to be shameful to the profession could be given than the various "treatments" for scurvy till some thoughtful layman discovered the true cause of the disease to be lack of vegetable food. A rational supply of vegetables or fruit and fruit juices and a diminished ration of salt meat sufficed to render all the armies, navies and camp dwellers of the world "immune."

This hot weather it is refreshing to know that the editor of the New York Sun recommends a cup of green or black tea as a thirst extinguisher. A teaspoonful of leaves should be put in a cup of hot water and when this has partially cooled it is fit for use. Alcoholic decoctions are not to be added, the mixture of tea and water alone being sufficient. As the sun gets blamed for a good deal of the discomfort prevalent just now, it is interesting to have another Sun coming to our rescue with timely information designed to counteract the deleterious influence of the larger body. Mrs. Ennecott (with a sigh)—It means that she's going down to her uncle's farm to spend the summer.—Chicago Record.

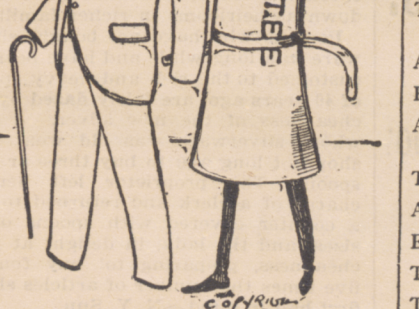
