and were highly gratified by the
 appearance of business enterprise and tact,
 presents itself to visitors. The whole
 from basement to roof, is now
 to the exigencies of the rapidly
 growing business; the partners residing
 at a distance from the business premises
 —perhaps we ought not to mention this

 fine business building is a commodious,
 and well appointed store, such as we (in

 of bright tinned-iron pipes, starting from
 it, to convey the hot air to the various
 apartments overhead. We presume these
 pipes are used in obedience to the pre-

cept taught in works on natural physics,
 viz:—"Bright and polished bodies reflect
 more, but radiate less." hence they con-
 vey the heat with but a small amount of
 loss. This large basement is used also as
 a ware-room for all heavy goods, such as
 Hardware, Paints, Oils, Glass, Earthen-
 ware and for bulky articles as Washtubs
