The Perth and Andover Driving Club are looking for a very busy racing season, with ten fast horses in the club, including four new-comers to this part of the country.

The first Oat Race of the season by well-known horsemen: Len Seeley (High-Knob Beauty), and M. Wright (Minnie Braden), will take place at Fort Fairfield New Year's Day.

The next big meet will be at Perth with an excursion train running from Presque Isle, Maine, it is announced by H. J. Pirie, president of the Perth and Andover Club. Fans will watch for the date to be announced later.

## Church Observes 84th. Anniversary

Complete Set of New Windows Dedicated at Bairdsville Services.

The 84th anniversary of the consecration of St. George's Church of England, Bairdsville, was celebrated on Sunday. A complete set of four new windows have replaced the original ones, in since the church was built 84 years ago. The new windows were put in the last week in November.

The rector, Rev. Joseph McAlden, conducted the service Sunday afternoon, when the windows were dedicated. The choir gave special music, with Miss Edith Mavor as organist.

Mr. McAlden preached and spoke of the history of the church. St. George's Church was the first building to be erected in this district for religious services. It was built in 1846. Quite a long line of rectors have ministered to the spiritual needs of this community, among whom were Revs. Gideon, S. J. Hanford, W. H. Street, L. A. Hoyt, S. Neales, M. C. Bedell, J. K. Hopkins, J. R. Belyea, J. R. Jones, J. Prescott and J. McAlden.

Harold Fitzherbert, of Muniac, who has been in the Fisher Memorial hospital, Woodstock, due to a bullet wound in his leg, received when he was fired upon while on a raft on the Saint John river, had an operation performed upon his leg for its removal on Tuesday. Dr. L. DeC. MacIntosh, of Hartland, performed the operation.

Gangrene setting in was the cause of the operation. The bullet had severed an artery which would not stop bleeding until a tourniquet was put on and kept on, preventing blood from reaching the lower part of the leg. The unfortunate lad has suffered considerably.
