Receives Twenty Days in Jail

Maine Man Sentenced for Driving Automobile While Under Influence of Liquor. Had Damaged Three Other Cars in Andover Sunday Evening.

George Wann, of Presque Isle, a school teacher of that place, was brought before Magistrate N. A. Hanson Tuesday morning, charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor on Sunday evening, through Andover when his car ran into three other cars and damaged them. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 20 days in jail.

Wann, in company with another Presque Isle man and two young women, was driving on the main highway through Andover at a reckless speed. A car owned by Wiley McLean, of Andover, with Mr. McLean in it, was parked at the right side of the road and Wann struck it, smashing the left front wheel. Another car was behind the McLean car, driven by J. Monteith, Jr., of Aroostook. It had been stopped when the driver saw the Wann car wildly driven approaching. The Monteith car received a bent mud-guard and broken bumperette. A third car was almost completely wrecked. This one had slowed down when it saw the other two run into, but did not escape. It was owned and driven by Colin MacDougall, of Fort Fairfield. He was accompanied by Mrs. MacDougall and two children. They escaped serious injury but are suffering from shock.

Mr. Wann's car had by this time come to the end of its days of usefulness. He was arrested by provincial police. The two girls were released on making a deposit, in case of being called as witnesses in the possible civil suit.

Baird, widow of the late Senator Baird of Perth and Andover, died at Ottawa, where she had been making her home for the past four years, on Tuesday evening, after an illness of two days. She had not been really well for some time. Her death will be learned with regret, both in Perth and Andover, where she lived for so many years, and in many circles elsewhere. Mrs. Baird would have been 71 years of age on November 18.

Mrs. Baird was born in Saint John, a daughter of the late Captain and Mrs. Dexter W. Sadler, and was of loyalist stock. The family came to the Tobique when she was about sixteen years old. She married in 1879, coming to Perth to live, where her husband was in business. They moved over to Andover in 1896. Mr. Baird died in 1917.

Mrs. Baird is survived by two sons, a sister and three brothers. The sons are Fred, of Vancouver, and Herbert, of Andover. Mrs. J. H. King, of Ottawa, is a sister. The brothers are Will and Fred Sadler, both of Maple View, and George, of Vancouver.

The funeral will be held on Friday morning at 10:30 o'clock.

Young Man Shot by Unknown Man When Crossing River Last Night.

Walter Fitzherbert, son of Atwood Fitzherbert, of Muniac, is now in the Fisher Memorial hospital, Woodstock, with a shattered leg bone, as a result of being hit last night by a rifle bullet, fired by an unknown man. He was crossing the river in a boat, with a light, and accompanied by his young brother, when two shots were fired at them from the River de Chute side. An automobile had come along, stopped, and two men got out, who shot at the Fitzherberts, then got into their car and drove away. One bullet struck Walter above the knee, shattering the bone, the other passed between him and his brother.

They managed to get back to shore and Dr. A. F. MacIntosh, of Andover, was called. He took the injured man to Woodstock and removed the bullet at the Fisher Memorial hospital.

The Provincial police are now working on the case and arrests may be expected at any time.

Among the resolutions passed were: a committee of the association prepare the freight rates case for Premier Baxter; that the president arrange a meeting with the Premier, Minister of Agriculture and Members of the Government for a delegation representing the potato industry, consisting of shippers, growers, bankers, members of legislature and others interested; that the association request the government to contribute part of the expense of the freight rates case, and also that the Provincial Government send representatives of the association to Toronto Fair and prepare literature necessary for publicity in regard to New Brunswick potatoes; also that the Provincial Government be requested to obtain daily shipments of potatoes in carloads throughout Canada and to discuss obtaining independent marketing expert to stabilize selling prices.
