SOMETHING "OUT OF KILTER" IN POTATO CROP THIS YEAR?

Something is "Out of Kilter" some-
where in regard to the present potato
crop, thinks Professor M. P. Rasmus-
sen of the New York State College of
Agriculture at Cornell University.
"There have been few instances dur-
ing the past quarter century," he
writes, "when potato growers have
been faced with so puzzling a situation
as that which confronts them this
fall in deciding what should be a fair
price for their potatoes and when to
market them. Judging from the size
of the crop," he continues, "the potato
marketing situation this fall should be
relatively more favorable and prices
should be as good or better than they
were last October. But such prices as
are now being paid leave little room for
doubt that we are face to face with
something unusual. The 1930 Cana-
dian potato crop was estimated on
September 1 to be 66.6 million bushels.
This is 3.1 million bushels less than
last year. With the increased tariff
of 45 cents a bushel and current low
prices, it does not seem likely that
Canadian potatoes will offer serious
competition this fall. Statistically,
the competitive situation which the
late potato crop must face this fall
and winter is more favorable than
it was in 1929. Any improvement in
potato prices, then, seems to depend
to a large extent on the possibilities
for improvement in the business situ-
ation, as well as in the cessation of
violent declines in commodity prices.
It will probably pay potato growers
exceptionally well this winter to study
carefully all economic developments,
especially those relating to business
conditions and unemployment."

OUR BIBLE IN SPITE OF THE DEVIL

A terrific thunder-storm broke over
the monastery, and the spire of the
chapel was struck by lightning.
This may have been the devil's
means of showing his displeasure at
the transaction, or it may not have
been.
But that, we are told, is what hap-
pened after the monks of the Mon-
astery of St. Paul, in Carinthia, Aus-
tria, handed over to Dr. Vollbehre the
famous Gutenberg Bible on vellum.
Said to be the finest copy of the
Gutenberg Bible known, it is now
owned by the Congressional Library,
being part of the purchase authorized
at the last session of Congress of the
Vollbehre collection of incunabula, or
390 books printed before the year
1500.
To say that this Bible was secured
in spite of the devil, writes George H.
Sargent in the Boston Evening Trans-
cript, is not altogether fanciful, for—
"According to tradition, this par-
ticular Gutenberg Bible on vellum be-
longed to Dr. Faustus or Fust, the
partner of Schoeffer, in the earliest
printing.
"The process of printing from mov-
able types, as is well known, was for
a time kept secret, and Fust sold il-
luminated copies of the Bible as hand-
work. The production of such a great
work as the Bible in such quantities,
however, could only be the result of
magic, and Dr. Fust was supposed to
be in league with the devil.
"Little is actually known of Fust,
except that he was in partnership
with Schoeffer, and that he traveled
over Europe selling printed Bibles as
original manuscripts.
"He disappeared for years, but ul-
timately turned up as an old man in
Paris, where he sold to the King of
France this copy of the Gutenberg
Bible, which went to the Benedictine
Monastery at St. Blasius in the Black
Forest. Meanwhile Fust had become
a legend, and with his wife, Marguer-
ite, had become the hero and heroine
of Goethe's great drama."
The copy of the Gutenberg Bible,
says Mr. Sargent, remained in the
monastery hidden for centuries. At
the time of the Napoleonic wars it
was removed, for safety, to the Mon-
astery of St. Paul in Austria. In
1926 it was sold to Dr. Vollbehre, but

was retained in the monastery until
he had disposed of it to the United
States Government. It was when the
three volumes of the Bible were hand-
ed over to Dr. Vollbehre that the thun-
derstorm broke over the monastery.
It was because the monastery was
in dire financial straits, we read, that
the Bible was sold, and in transfer-
ring the three volumes to Dr. Voll-
behre, Dr. Herman Piessel, O. S. B.,
thanked Dr. Vollbehre for saving the
monastery's existence by converting the
book into virtuals, but especially for
placing the book where it will
never become an object of commerce,
but be held in the esteem worthy of
its contents and its venerable age.

Dr. Vollbehre, we read replied that
he looked upon the transaction as an
exchange of good-will, for which the
old world need not yield to feelings
of reproach or regret.
And as he is quoted by Mr. Sargent,
he went on:
"For here in Europe this book has
fulfilled its destiny.
"Across the sea it will continue
its creative and enlightening mission,
alike in the service of religious faith
and of scientific progress. Thus the
ancient tradition will live on.
"It is your great merit, most re-
verend patron, to have smoothed the
way for the fulfillment of its cultur-
al purpose. The entire civilized world
owes you a debt of gratitude for hav-
ing released this book from its seclu-
sion and sending it upon its apostolic
journey.
"In this spirit I accept this Book
of Books from your hands. May it
carry across the seas the inward es-
sence of its immortality, and may God
prosper its inspired mission!"—The
Literary Digest.

ARE PEOPLE AFRAID TO
GO INTO YOUR STORE?
Many People Hate Shopping and
Will Go Into the Store That Does
the Best Descriptive Advertising.

It would probably be a shock to
most merchants to be told that there
were people who were afraid to go in-
to their store. And yet it's a fact.
Not people who owe them money,
either, but good, honest cash custom-
ers.

There are lots of people who are
natural shoppers, people who enjoy
going up and down the aisles pawing
things over; but there are lots more
who won't go into a store unless they
have to buy something and then they
get the ordeal over with as quickly
as possible. They are afraid of being
talked to; afraid of being talked in-
to buying something they do not want;
afraid of selecting the wrong thing;
afraid of not being able to find the
thing they want; afraid of finding it
costs more than they want to pay, and
afraid of being unable to refuse to
buy it on that account.

Don't laugh at these fears. They
are very real, and constitute a fac-
tor of sales resistance which no re-
tail merchant can afford to overlook.

It is the firm conviction of the writ-
er that this reluctance to go into stores
is one of the principal reasons for the
great success of mail order selling.

In the safety of his own home,
free from the hurry and confusion
of the store, free from the urgings of
overzealous salespeople, the customer
studies the catalog, compares the
various articles, weights, desire of pos-
session against price, and reaches a de-
cision that is not likely to be changed
or regretted. The mail-order house
gives him full information on various
grades and qualities, range of sizes
and colors, a straightforward descrip-
tion of materials. And it tells him
exactly what it costs.

Mail order buying is not governed
entirely by reasons of convenience
or lower price. The method itself is
preferred by many people.
This is demonstrated by the ex-
perience of one of the largest and
most exclusive stores on Fifth Ave-
nue, a store which has for many
years maintained a mail-order-depart-
ment.
It finds that a large proportion
of its mail-order patrons are within easy
reach of the store—some are literally
just around the corner. They prefer
to make their selections from the
catalog, rather than from the larger
and more varied stocks available in
the regular retail departments. It has
a mail-order section in the store where
its customers can purchase articles
they have already selected from the
catalog.
The independent merchant complains
that he is losing trade. Look at his
advertising:
"John Jones, Ladies' Ready to Wear
Complete Line of U-to-Date Merchan-
dise, Reasonable Prices."
He is losing his business to the
mail-order stores, the chain stores,
the big department stores. Look at
their advertising—pictures, descrip-
tions, prices. They don't say, "Come
to the store and I will try to sell you
something." They say, "Here is what
we have; here is what it costs."
Even the most store-shy people
will go in to buy something they
want at a price they want to pay.
The greatest service any publisher
can render his advertisers is to help
them, encourage them, if necessary
compel them, to be specific—to avoid
generalities that mean nothing, and
tell what they have to sell and how
much it costs. When they do that,
advertising will pay them and pay the
newspaper, too.—FRANK T. DEN-
MAN, in Linotype News.

Eight Factors

Botanical experts of the Dominion
Department of Agriculture emphasize
the importance of eight principal
factors in the control of cereal diseases.
(1) exclusion; (2) eradication; (3)
seed selection; (4) seed treatment;
(5) dusting and spraying; (6) cul-
tural methods; (7) sanitation and (8)
disease resistant varieties. Only by
careful attention to these important
phases of disease control can cereal
crops be developed and maintained on
the most profitable basis to Canadian
farmers.

A Repeat Order

Peaches, pears and plums from On-
tario are proving their worth in the
British West Indies. Early in Septem-
ber the Dominion Fruit Branch ar-
ranged a test shipment to Port au Spain,
Trinidad. The shipment left Halifax
on the SS. Lady Hawkins on Septem-
ber 8. The first report received on
the shipment was a repeat order by
cable—the most satisfactory form of
report to receive.

Revenue Dollar Cost

The Bureau of statistics at Ottawa
provides some interesting information
with respect to the amount of capital
investment in land, buildings, equip-
ment and livestock it takes to earn a
dollar of production revenue in Cana-
da. Using the figures provided by
the Bureau's estimates with respect
to last year we find the investment
cost of producing the revenue dollar
by provinces was:
Prince Edward Island \$3.88
Nova Scotia 3.87
New Brunswick 4.50
Quebec 4.55
Ontario 4.47
Manitoba 5.24
Saskatchewan 5.56
Alberta 4.80
British Columbia 4.54
Dominion Average 4.78
It requires a larger capital invest-
ment to farm in Western Canada than
in the East.—Dominion Department of
Agriculture.

The day when one or two thousand
acres was considered a large farm
seems to have passed in Western Can-
ada. Seven large land-owning com-
panies now propose to farm a total
area of about 850,000 acres. Great
resources of capital are back of the
enterprise and in order to bring scat-
tered farms into one large area in-
tervening lands may be purchased.

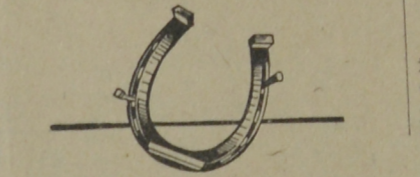
