Miss Violet Boone arrived home on Saturday from Fredericton, where she has been attending Normal School.

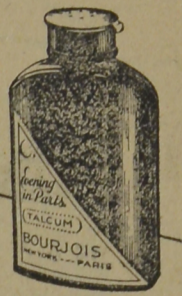
George Wood, of Bath, held service in the Baptist church here Sunday afternoon, having exchanged pulpits with his father, Rev. John Wood, for the day.
