New Bridges Will be Built

One on the Tobique

Contracts for two more new highway bridges, one in Sunbury county and the other in Victoria county, have been awarded by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.

The contract for Bell Bridge in the Parish of Blissville, Sunbury county, on the road leading from Juvenile Settlement to Hoyt, has been awarded to Smith & Williamson, of Saint John, the approximate price being \$8,000. This structure consists of two U concrete abutments supporting a covered Howe truss span of 123 feet, 4 inches, centre to centre of end angle blocks with stone and earth embankment approaches thereto. This work covers a total length of 634 feet and will greatly improve the alignment of the highway at this point.

The contract for Odellie bridge in the Parish of Gordon, Victoria county, on the road leading from Perth to Plaster Rock, has been awarded to J. D. Fulton & Company, of Woodstock, the approximate price being \$7,500. This structure consists of a 30-foot reinforced concrete slab span on concrete abutments with stone and earth embankment approaches thereto. The work will cover a total length of 1,140 feet. There will be considerable road diversion in connection with the carrying out of this contract, which will greatly improve the alignment of the roadway at this point.

INDUCTED AT ANDOVER

MacLean, B.A., recently appointed minister of the Andover-Aroostook-Kilburn circuit of the United Church of Canada, was inducted to his new pastorate on Thursday evening in St. James United Church at Andover, Rev. F. E. Archibald, of Plaster Rock, presiding. There was a representative congregation present. Rev. John Wood, pastor of the United Baptist church, was present. Prayer was offered and the induction service read by Rev. F. E. Archibald. The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. Joseph McAllden of Trinity church, Andover. The charge to the newly inducted minister was read by Rev. Gordon Pringle, of Kincardine, and to the congregation by Rev. G. A. Sellar, late of Jacksonville, Carleton county. The service was closed by a few words from the newly inducted minister.

Rev. Mr. MacLean comes from Hopeville, N. S., and is a graduate in Arts from Dalhousie University, and in Divinity from Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax. He had an excellent scholastic record, especially as an orator. He was ordained at the recent Conference of the United Church at Sackville. Mr. MacLean is being warmly welcomed by his congregation and all look forward to an exceedingly successful pastorate.
