Screen Taken Out of Fishway?

So Story Goes but Actual Facts Otherwise.

It was reported that a screen, of chicken wire or similar material, had been taken out of the fishway at the Plaster Rock mill dam last week. B. S. Moore, superintendent of the Tobique Salmon Club, questioned about the matter, stated that to the best of his knowledge such a screen to prevent fish from going up the river had not been found there, and that during the past three weeks he had had men watching the dam and the fish gathered there. The trouble was that about the first of June high bulkheads had been placed on the dam to raise the water in order to float logs off an island above the dam. This work is usually done in August but due to the small amount of material on hand this year was done earlier. For three weeks fish could not get up the stream. The bulkhead boards were completely removed on Monday.

Victoria County Council Meets

Council Chamber, Andover, N. B., July 7, 1931. Council convened at 11 a. m. Councilors all present and Warden Ridgewell in the chair.

Dickinson, "That the Council bring to the attention of the Minister of Public Works, the purchase of a snow plough by Supervisor Tomlinson, from Mr. Paul, in January, 1929, for which Mr. Paul has not received payment." The warden called for report of committee appointed to gather information and plans re the proposed jail. As Mr. Costigan, chairman of said committee, was not present, there were no plans to consider.

Motor Accidents Are Increasing

Some Injured—Three Taken to Hospital Tuesday Afternoon—Several Automobiles Damaged.

Several accidents over the weekend, on Monday and also on Tuesday, are reported. Details are not available in all cases. The 1930 motoring season brought forth many serious automobile accidents and apparently the 1931 season, now approaching its height, may equal the 1930 record.

Tuesday afternoon three young men were taken to the Fort Fairfield hospital as a result of one accident on the Tobique road.

At the top of the Muniac hill, Sunday, a roadster, driven by George Baird, of Andover, collided with a large sedan driven by Miss Clara Hagerman, of Hartland. There were three cars proceeding south and on the hill at the time. The Hagerman car was going north. The Baird car was behind a Maine car, which passed an automobile ahead. Baird followed the Maine car and in addition to passing the car which had been passed by the Maine car had to pass the latter also. While doing this the automobile, driven by Miss Hagerman appeared and a collision could not be avoided as the Baird car was then on the left hand side of the road with two cars to the right of him. Mr. Baird's roadster was struck in the side and damaged considerably as was also the Hagerman automobile. The wheels had to be taken off the roadster before it could be moved. Both cars were brought to the Armstrong garage, Perth. Fortunately no one was injured.

Another accident on Sunday is reported to have occurred at Riley Brook, when two cars collided. There is no foundation for the report.

Late Monday night John Gray, of Plaster Rock, driving to Perth with other occupants in his car, was run into by another automobile in the "Gulch." The Sheriff, F. V. Bishop, and county constable, G. Gee, of Andover, were called to the scene. The cars were brought to Andover. The offending motorist, Arch Schriver, of Florenceville, agreed to pay all damages.

Tuesday afternoon a car speeding along the highway left the road at Linton Corner, two miles below Plaster Rock, was damaged and the occupants, young men, injured, being taken to the hospital at Fort Fairfield. The injured are McKay, of West Orange, N.J., and Kane and Schindler, both of Elizabeth, N.J. The others in the car were not hurt. It was thought at first that one of those taken to the hospital had a broken arm but it was not. One left the hospital Wednesday, and the other two are expected out today.

Annual Meeting Electric District

Annual Meeting of Andover and Perth Electric District Held Monday Evening—Postponed from Previous Tuesday.

The annual meeting of the Perth and Andover Electric District was held in the Specialty theatre Monday evening with a small attendance. The meeting had been postponed from the last Tuesday in June. The reports of the commissioners, secretary and auditor were read by George Wright, the secretary, also minutes of the previous annual meeting. They were adopted as read and thoroughly discussed and commented on by many of those present. H. S. Wade acted as chairman of the meeting as he was chairman of the commissioners.

W. H. McPhail moved that the commissioners adopt a new scale of rates and have technical guidance in doing same. This motion was seconded by Dr. R. W. Earle and carried.

The Porter claim of \$500 was left in the hands of the commissioners to settle.

P. T. Heffernan made a motion to the effect that a special meeting be called to consider sale of the system. This was seconded by C. E. Raymond. There was some discussion about this, many expressing themselves in favour of selling and some against.

Guy G. Porter moved that the same system of collection of bills as in Grand Falls be adopted. The motion was seconded by W. H. McPhail and carried. In Grand Falls the accounts are payable at one of the banks.

C. L. Olmstead was elected a commissioner in place of H. S. Wade, whose term had expired.

The amount of \$600 was assessed for street lighting purposes.

During the past year the system showed a profit on electricity sold for light, a loss on power and a net profit. Rates will probably be adjusted to give a higher rate for power.

Since the establishment of the system over \$12,000 has been paid out in interest.

The sum of \$11,654.18 was taken in during the year, and this included \$57.87 on hand at the beginning and \$2,500 received for line from the substitution to the boundary. The amount paid out came to \$10,856.03. Delinquent accounts and other assets, including distribution system, come to \$17,782.94. The liabilities total \$11,600.85. More light and power was sold during the past fiscal year than in the previous period.
