THE DEANERY OF WOODSTOCK

The quarterly meeting of the Woodstock Deanery was held on the 7th and 8th inst., at Edmundston. Evening song was held in St. John the Baptist's Church 7:30, when the service was read by the Rev. E. R. McCordick, E. Parkinson, and the lessons read and the sermon preached by F. C. Jackson.

On Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock the Holy Eucharist was celebrated by the Rural Dean, Rev. S. C. Gray, followed by a devotional address by Rev. J. McAlden. The business session began with the Rural Dean in the chair, at 10:00 a. m., and after the reading of the minutes, and a portion of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek and discussed, several papers were read. Maine Railway Man Kills Record Salmon Of Season on Tobique

Wingate F. Cram, of Bangor, Lands Salmon Weighing 28 Pounds 15 Ounces at Riley Brook—Had Fine Catch of 10 Fish in Four Days—Dr. A. K. Wade, of Perth, Close Second, With Salmon Weighing 28 Pounds.

This is apparently a season of record salmon catches on the Upper Saint John river. Non-resident anglers have been particularly fortunate on the Saint John this season and large salmon have been taken at Hart's Island, the Oxbow pool on the Tobique and now comes word of the record salmon for 1932 taken on the Hayden pool, at Riley Brook.

Wingate F. Cram, treasurer of the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad, one of New England's best known railway executives, has the honour of killing the largest salmon of the season on the Tobique waters. Mr. Cram killed a salmon weighing 28 pounds 15 ounces the other day to set up a new mark for salmon anglers in the three Maritime Provinces for this season. He killed this record fish on an eight ounce rod while being guided by James E. Hayden, of Riley Brook. Incidentally Mr. Cram, who was accompanied on his fishing trip to New Brunswick by Frank E. Lowe, of Portland, Maine, landed no less than 10 salmon in four days, getting five fish on the last day he fished the pool.

On Thursday evening last—or rather Friday morning—Dr. A. K. Wade, of Perth, caught a salmon weighing 28 pounds at the Davis pool. This fish put up a lengthy resistance and was finally landed at 1:30 in the morning, in a heavy rain, having been hooked about four hours previously.

High Sheriff F. V. Bishop chased a speeder from Andover to the bridge over the Aroostook river above Aroostook village Tuesday. The offending motorist was driving at 60 miles an hour and better and passed the Sheriff at Andover. LUMBER OPERATORS RUSHING SHIPMENTS

The lumber export business in New Brunswick is enjoying unusual stimulus at the present time, with operators making an effort to land their products in the United States before the new duties go into effect on June 21.

It is estimated that within a 10-day period 10,000,000 superficial feet of lumber, dressed and undressed, will be shipped, the railways getting the bulk of the shipments. Other lumbering provinces of Canada are showing similar activity.

The new duties are the highest ever to militate against Canadian lumber. The imposition is \$4 per thousand feet on dressed lumber and \$3 on undressed lumber. Formerly there was a duty of \$1 per thousand on dressed lumber and no duty on the undressed material. A high duty on lumber in the United States is not unusual, but it is several years since there has been a levy comparable with that which will be effect in a week.

Shipments are general in the main lumbering areas of the province. Fraser Companies, Ltd., are among the heavy exporters, and smaller operators also are active. Several operators are shipping on consignment to the United States.

In this section of the province lumber is being transported into nearby Maine towns by truck.

Annual Meeting of Perth Water District

Reports Received, Motions Adopted, Commissioner Elected and Meeting Adjourned to Next Tuesday to Receive Report of a Committee on Discounts, Delinquent Taxes and New Form of Tax.

The annual meeting of the Perth Water District was held Tuesday evening in the hosehouse with a good attendance. R. W. Estabrook was re-elected a commissioner, his term expiring. He was chairman during the past year and for the ensuing year Ralph Sadler will be chairman, assuming that position in order of seniority. There was considerable discussion of various matters throughout the meeting, including delinquent taxes and the handling of the fire equipment.

R. W. Estabrook was in the chair and the secretary, H. E. Blakslee, was present. The secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting which were approved. The secretary then gave his annual report, followed by the report of the auditor, C. L. Olmstead. The chairman of the commissioners then presented their report, followed by verbal reports from the caretaker of the system, J. E. Woodland, and the fire chief, H. E. Howlett. The following information was contained in the reports of the secretary and the treasurer: expenditures during the past year, \$2,700; receipts for the past year, \$2,000; delinquent taxes to date, \$1478.84; assessment for past year, \$2,500; estimated fixed charges for past year were \$2,063.05; estimated fixed charges for ensuing year of 1932-33, \$1306.25 plus debenture depreciation in payment of bonds due of about \$500; total bond debt of system, \$20,500 and value of system about \$12,000 more than debt; debentures due this year amounting to \$10,000 being paid off, \$7,500 in cash and \$2,500 in bonds. These latter bonds are an unsold part of an old issue and the \$500 mentioned above in estimated expenditures for coming year is the depreciation on these bonds used for payment due to state of the bond market at the present time. There is owing to the Bank of Montreal a loan of \$1,400 and to H. E. Blakslee \$300.

Fixed charges for the year of 1932-33 were estimated to be as follows: interest on debentures, \$525.00; overdue interest, \$131.25; caretaker's salary, \$200.00; fire department, \$100.00; sundry repairs, \$200.00; secretary and collector, \$150.00; depreciation on bonds used as part payment on debentures due, \$500.00.

For sinking fund requirements a sufficient amount is expected to be provided by collection of delinquent taxes.

In the report of the caretaker he referred particularly to the need in the near future of replacing the intake pipe from head to reservoir and the need of having more water coming into the reservoir than at present.

A motion was carried to the effect that the fire equipment was not to be taken out of the district other than to Andover.

The assessment for 1932-33 was voted at \$2,000.

H. S. Wade recommended a tap tax to collect from transients and others occupying rented houses, payment to be collected from landlord.

In view of the present state of the bond market it was voted to postpone replacement of the intake pipe and do some repairs this year. A committee was appointed to act with the commissioners on the question of tap tax, delinquent taxes and discounts for prompt payment to report at a meeting to be held next Tuesday.

St. Leonard-Campbellton Highway And New Grand Falls Broadway Are Opened With Ceremony

The new Broadway of Grand Falls was formally opened for traffic Thursday morning by Hon. C. D. Richards, Premier of New Brunswick. This street, one of the finest in eastern Canada, forms part of the trans-Canada highway and is concrete paved. The Premier, in opening the new street, declared it was fittingly called Broadway, since it was without doubt the widest and one of the most beautiful thoroughfares in the province.

Mayor H. L. Mulherrin, Grand Falls, presided at the ceremony. Speeches were made from a specially constructed platform in front of the war memorial, which stands at the head of Broadway. Speakers included Hon. A. J. Leger, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer; B. Frank Smith, M.P.; Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines; F. W. Pirie, M.L.A., and Mayor Mulherrin. The Grand Falls band provided the musical programme and hundreds of citizens braved the inclement weather to welcome the visitors. The school children formed part of the parade and Premier Richards declared a holiday in the schools of the town to commemorate the occasion.

From Grand Falls the official party proceeded to St. Leonard, where a parade was formed. It proceeded to the green arch which had been erected at the west end of the new route. No. 17, preceded by a mounted escort of firemen. The premier formally opened the new road, by cutting the cord drawn across the arch with a pair of silver-mounted shears and declared the road between Campbellton and St. Leonard, which he named the Stewart highway, formally opened for traffic. The shears were presented to Hon. Mr. Stewart.

On arrival at St. Quentin the new dairy there was officially opened by the premier and his colleagues.

The official party then passed through Kedgwick enroute to Campbellton, the east end of the new highway, where crowds had been waiting for hours in the drizzling rain.
