

Proceedings of the January Session Of Victoria County Council

(Continued from Last Week)

Resolution re "Gulch" road, urging stricter police supervision and prevention of partaking of intoxicants along the road.

Resolution re Bairdsville road, urging Provincial Government to bring this section up to standard of rest of highway.

Resolution re motor trucks, stating that the Council was opposed to any increase in license fees or other restrictions on motor trucks or automobiles.

Resolution re National Park, endorsing the location or the Mount Carleton site or nearby sections as the most suitable and urging early selection of the site to absorb the present unemployed.

Resolution re T. B. patients, protesting against the provisions of the Public Hospital Act, in which costs of needy patients are to be charged against the town or municipality in which the patient resides, and that it is the opinion of the council that such expenses should be borne by the Provincial Government.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

Seconded by Councillor Gray. Carried.

Moved by Councillor Rideout, seconded by Councillor Moran, "That the Revisors' fees for the present year shall be \$30.00 each for the Parish of Drummond, and \$20.00 each for the other Parishes." Motion carried. Councillors Campbell and Gray voting against.

Moved by Councillor Anderson, seconded by Councillor Heffernan, "That the motion re calling the county auditor to audit the tax collectors' books be rescinded." Carried.

Moved by Councillor Anderson, seconded by Councillor Cote, "That the Council employ Frank Wade to audit tax collectors' books."

Councillor Hiscock moved the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Councillor Moran and carried:

Resolution re Gulch Road.

Moved by Councillor Dionne, seconded by Councillor Rideout, "That Councillor Heffernan's expenses in connection with trip to Fredericton as a delegate from the Council be paid by the County." Carried.

Moved by Councillor Dionne, seconded by Councillor Gray and carried, "That by-law Number 16 be amended to read: The fees for pedlars' licenses in the County of Victoria shall be as follows:

Resident one-horse pedlar	\$15.00
Resident two-horse pedlar	35.00
Non-resident one-horse pedlar	35.00
Non-resident two-horse pedlar	75.00
Auto truck, resident	25.00
Auto truck, non-resident	75.00

Moved by Councillor Dionne, seconded by Councillor Cote, and carried, "That by-law Number 5 be amended to read: "Any circus exhibiting in the county shall pay a fee of \$50.00 before showing."

Moved by Councillor Dionne, seconded by Councillor Estey, "That by-law Number 12 be amended as follows:

"Field Drivers' fees shall be: for every bull over six months of age, \$5.00; for every cow or neat cattle, \$1.00.

"A fine of \$40.00 shall be imposed on the owner of any bull over one year old found running at large."

Moved by Councillor Gray, in amendment, seconded by Councillor Hiscock, "That the fine mentioned in motion above be \$20.00 instead of \$40.00." Amendment lost. Councillors Campbell, Gray and Hiscock voting for. Original motion carried. Councillors Campbell, Gray and Hiscock voting against.

Moved by Councillor Anderson, seconded by Councillor Heffernan, "That the sum of \$1,500 be assessed on the Parish of Andover for poor purposes. That the chairman of the Overseers of the Poor be paid \$50.00 and the others \$10.00 each. That the road tax be 40 cents on \$100.00, and that the assessors for the Parish be paid 4 per cent. for the amount assessed." Carried.

On motion confirmed Council adjourned until 10 a. m., Saturday.

January 23, 1932.

Council convened at 10 a. m., Saturday, the Warden in the chair and all Councillors present.

On motion confirmed the minutes were approved as read.

A bill of F. V. Bishop, showing balance of \$2.40 due on expenses in connection with taking Mrs. Alice Clement to Provincial Hospital, was presented by Councillor Rideout.

Moved by Councillor Heffernan, seconded by Councillor Rideout, "That the bill of \$2.40, above mentioned, be paid." Carried.

Moved by Councillor Rideout, seconded by Councillor Cote, "That the bill of Robert Bishop for janitor service, amounting to \$5.00 be paid." Carried.

RESOLUTION

Of Victoria County Council to Borrow Money

WHEREAS by Chapter 68 of the Acts of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick (60 Victoria 1891) this Council is authorized by a two-thirds vote thereof from time to time to make temporary loans and to borrow such sums as may be required to pay claims against the Municipality, such loans remaining unpaid at any time not to exceed two thousand dollars.

AND WHEREAS by Chapter 91 of the Acts of Assembly (9 Edward VII 1903) the Municipality is authorized to borrow in addition to the above mentioned sum of two thousand dollars from any bank or banks such further sums as may be required to pay claims against the Municipality, such further sums not at any one time to exceed two thousand dollars.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Warden and Secretary-Treasurer be empowered to borrow for the Municipality from the Bank of Montreal such sums of money as may be required from time to time to pay the claims against the municipality, such loan or loans at any one time not to exceed the sum of four thousand dollars, and to arrange and agree with said bank as to the terms and conditions of such loans and of the manner in which the moneys shall be advanced by the bank and arrange for the moneys being deposited and agree with such bank as to the rate of interest to be allowed on deposits and paid on advances.

Council Chamber, Andover, N. B.

Councillor Heffernan advocated that the July session be dispensed with and the business be transacted by a committee appointed by the Board. The opinion of the Board, however, was that this action was not entirely satisfactory to the ratepayers.

Moved by Councillor Hiscock, seconded by Councillor Cote, "That this Council recommend to the Assessors of the Parish of Andover that they assess the Maine & N. B. Power Co., on a valuation of at least \$250,000, as it is in our opinion that this company has never been assessed on an equal basis with other ratepayers in the Parish of Andover. Also that the secretary will kindly request the Attorney-General of this Province to assist him in getting a true statement of the real value of their (The Maine and N. B. Power Company's) property in the Parishes of Andover and Grand Falls." Carried.

Moved by Councillor Dickinson, seconded by Councillor Heffernan, "That the Secretary-Treasurer be included with the delegates to the Union of Municipalities with expenses paid." Carried.

Moved by Councillor Dionne, seconded by Councillor Cote, and carried, "That by-law Number 1 be amended to read:

1. No person shall use or run any bowling alley, pool or billiard table, dance hall or boxing bout for pay or hire in the County of Victoria without having first obtained a license therefor from the Secretary-Treasurer of the County. The fee for a single bowling alley shall

be ten dollars and for each additional alley on the same premises five dollars, and for each pool or billiard table, dance hall a fee of \$50; boxing bout fee ten dollars. Such license shall expire and be of no effect on the first day of January next after the issue thereof.

2. The room containing any such bowling alley or table or used for dances or boxing bouts so licensed shall be closed and no such alley, table or room shall be used between eleven o'clock on Saturday night and seven o'clock on the next Monday morning.

3. The Secretary may refuse to issue a license under this by-law if the two Councillors of the Parish in which it is proposed to operate any bowling alley, pool or billiard table or hold dances or boxing bouts, do certify under their hand that the person applying for such license is not a fit and proper person to have such license.

4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment for sixty days.

Each Parish Officer to receive a copy of by-law.

Moved by Councillor Hiscock, seconded by Councillor Heffernan, "That the resolutions adopted by the Board be noted in the pamphlet and the complete resolutions printed in the Victoria News." Carried.

On motion confirmed the Warden declared a short recess.

Council reassembled, and Councillor Heffernan moved "That a vote thanks be tendered Mrs. MacPhail, and a bonus of \$5.00 granted her," seconded by Councillor Campbell. Carried.

Moved by Councillor Hiscock, seconded by Councillor Gray. Carried.

The minutes of the present session were read.

Councillor Dionne congratulated the Warden on the capable manner in which he conducted the affairs of the Council, and moved that a vote of thanks be tendered him by the members of the Board. Motion seconded by Councillor Gray and carried unanimously.

The Warden, A. C. Jensen, thanked the members for their kindness and expressed his pleasure in working with such a Board.

On motion confirmed the minutes of the present session were approved as read.

On motion confirmed Council adjourned sine die.
