## Grand Falls Included in Gigantic Merger

Neal C. Head, assistant to the president of the International Pulp and Paper Company, who arrived from New York in the Province recently, commenting on his corporation's water power holdings, said the St. John River Power Company development at Grand Falls was now included in a gigantic merger which embraced the pulp and paper organization's water powers on the continent.

Mr. Head explained the Grand Falls plant had already been merged with the Gatineau development in Upper Canada which in turn was included in an all-Canada grouping. The Canadian holdings were then merged en bloc with those of the United States and are together known as the International Hydro-Electric System. This system owns all the common stock of the Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation which includes the Gatineau and St. John river plants.

Asked if this realignment of the power holdings of the big pulp and paper concern would have a bearing on the operation of the plants in Canada, Mr. Head said not in the least. He said it was merely a unification and obviously a simplification of the far-flung holdings of the corporation which he represented.

The statement referred to, issued by the International Hydro Electric System, from its eastern offices, 89 Broad street, Boston, claimed for the new line-up of water powers the third largest hydro electric ownership in the world.
