Woodstock Man in Critical Condition Following Accident

Charles M. Moore, of Woodstock, in Grand Falls Hospital with Fractured Skull, the Result of an Automobile Accident on Monday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moore, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Sutherland, of Woodstock, motoring to Edmundston on Monday evening, met with a serious accident between 7:00 and 8:00, when the Ford coupe they were in left the road about 10 miles below Grand Falls on the Portage road. Mr. and Mrs. Moore were in the front seat and the Sutherlands in the rumble seat. Moore, who was driving at a fast rate of speed, applied his brakes suddenly when he came to a bad turn and the car left the road. The car was badly damaged. The occupants were all thrown into the road, Moore sustaining a fractured skull as well as other bruises.

Harry Bowmaster, Rev. Father Pennefort and A. H. Tweedie arrived on the scene in a few minutes. Moore was conveyed to the Grand Falls Private Hospital on a truck driven by Jesse Tudor. The others were taken to A. McCarthy's and later taken to the hospital by W. McMahon of the R.C.M.P., stationed at St. Leonards. M. J. Kelly of R.C.M.P., of Grand Falls, being absent on a case.

Sutherland was not hurt, but both ladies were badly shaken up and bruised, and are still in the hospital. Moore's condition continues the same, being conscious several times on Tuesday, and recognizing his people, and again relapsing into unconsciousness. There are hopes for his recovery.

Canadian Potato Acreage Is Less

The Federal Bureau of Statistics states that the acreage planted to potatoes is 543,700 as compared with 583,926 acres in 1931, which represents a decrease of 7 per cent. Quebec is the only province reporting an increase; plantings in Saskatchewan are about equal to last year while the balance of the provinces all report decreases, the greatest of which is in New Brunswick. Growing conditions in the three Maritime provinces were favourable except for a short period immediately following planting when cool, dry weather delayed germination in some sections. Quebec reports similar conditions while in Ontario a favourable growth has been reported but a big restriction in the use of commercial fertilizers is expected to reduce the yield in some districts. Favourable growth is reported in all sections of the Prairie provinces, although insects are present but little damage has been done. In British Columbia cool wet weather during the early part of the season retarded development to some extent but recent conditions have been favourable and satisfactory growth is reported. SOME BLIGHT REPORTED

There are slight indications of early potato blight in Aroostook county, Maine, and New Brunswick. Spraying with a 10-10-10 Bordeaux mixture, two or three nozzles to the row and a minimum pressure of 250 pounds is recommended.

The main object of the meeting was to appoint committees to look after the different activities which are necessary for the carrying on of a county fair. The committees and officials, as they were appointed, are as follows:

With reference to the horse pull, it was decided to endeavour to have three classes which would enable teams of different weights to compete according to the weight. The minimum and maximum weights in these classes will be announced later. The owners of all teams competing in this contest must be prepared to produce a satisfactory weight bill of the team which he intends pulling. There will, in all probability, be prizes totaling \$30.00 which will go to the winners in this contest.
