

Falsehood And Deceit On Part Of The Opposition

Fairville Mill Bought All Its Pulpwood in Province of New Brunswick.

The Opposition party at the beginning of the campaign based its drive against the Government by condemning the action by which assistance was rendered the Port Royal Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd. By the assistance of the Government this mill situated at Fairville, was kept in operation and has given employment to hundreds of millmen and hundreds more in the woods of the province. Finding that the people were in absolute accord with the Government's action, the Opposition tried to think up another line and so a few days ago one of the Opposition candidates launched an attack of poison gas, stating that pulpwood used by the Fairville mill came from Quebec and that New Brunswick pulpwood would not be bought by the mill. This statement, the candidate knew was false, nevertheless the word apparently had gone out from Opposition headquarters to be ruthless, anything was to be used in a last desperate drive and so another attempt was made to fool the people, by broadcasting a deliberate falsehood.

Present Government Is Doing Everything Possible To Help the People.

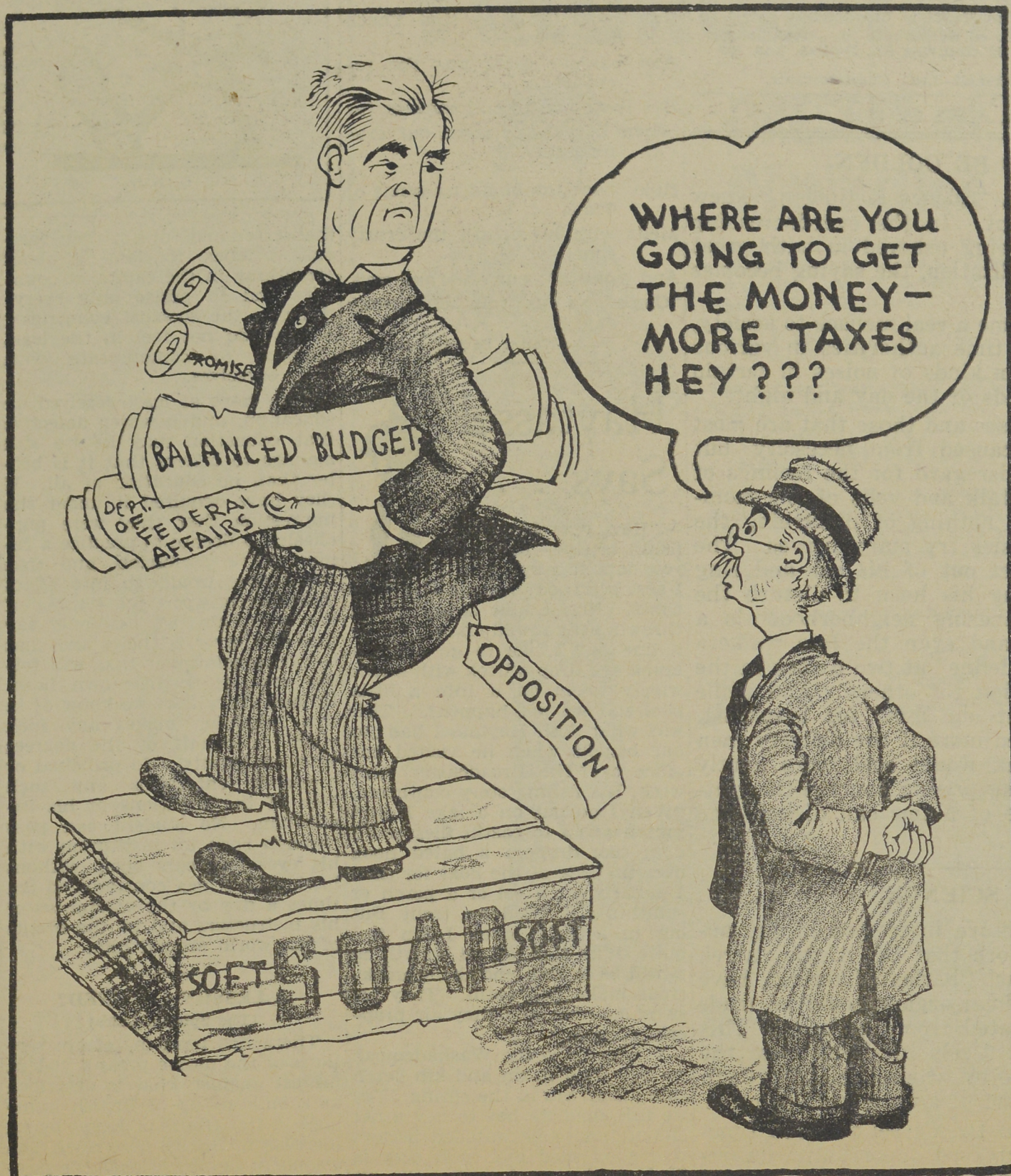
