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Some Constructive Thought Is Need Of Opposition Party

Mere "Criticism" And "Condemnation" Are Not Enough to Offer to People of New Brunswick in Times of Stress.

Pick up any press report of any Opposition meeting and read any of the addresses of Mr. Dysart or Mr. McNair, or of Opposition speakers generally and it will be found that "he criticized" or "he condemned" the Government, or its members or some or its supporters.

Criticism of a business, whether it be governmental or private, is not only needed but welcomed, but it should be constructive criticism. If some one came along and told a farmer that he was not plowing a field properly or that he was using wrong methods in planting, the farmer would be justified in telling him to go about

his own business. But if some one came along and showed a farmer how he could do a better job of plowing or by different methods of planting he could raise better crops, then that farmer would welcome the suggestion for improvement. Constructive criticism is needed and welcomed but destructive criticism is not wanted and usually it will be found that the person offering destructive criticism is doing so for his own personal gain and advantage. As the farmer wants the best methods of farming, so the people want the best in government and constructive criticism of the Tilley Government will be welcomed by the people and the members of the Government themselves.

Up to the present, however, not one utterance of a constructive nature has come from Mr. Dysart or the members of his party. Their whole effort appears to be to try and destroy the confidence of the people of New Brunswick in Premier Tilley, while they have no constructive thought to offer. Their whole argument is one of condemnation.

They talk of reducing automobile fees. They would bring in old age pensions, but they do not say where they will get the money to do these things. There is only one source of income for a government and that is from the people. Do you want more taxes than you already have? If so, that is what the Opposition is promising, and the promises being made cannot be carried out without more taxes.

Government Bases Appeal On Past Accomplishments

Opposition Has Nothing of Tangible Value to Offer to the People of New Brunswick.

All of us have been called upon from time to time by salesmen. The businessman, the farmer, the fisherman, the housewife, all receive periodical visits from the party with something to sell. When this canvasser calls, if he has something worth while to sell, and if he is a good salesman, he is not interested in his competitor, he will not take up your time condemning another make of goods; he is interested in showing you the qualities of and the work that his particular gadget will do—the work it will perform, the service it will render. His idea is to convince you that he has something worth while for you to invest your money in. That is modern-day salesmanship.

Mr. Dysart is in the field selling. He is calling on the voters of New Brunswick to buy his wares. He, unfortunately, has no record of performance that he can show as to what his particular line of goods can do. As a matter of fact, has he anything worth while to sell, or is it not merely an election promise, not even a hope? He does not take up any of your time telling you what his bag of tricks will do, what work they can perform. His sales argument is apparently condemning what the Tilley Government has done, and is doing in the hope that he may persuade you to buy his box of gadgets. Now, if a salesman undertook to

sell you any article or service on this basis, we are quite sure his sales argument would be of little value, and we should give the same consideration to any political sales argument that has nothing to offer. Tilley and his Government are rendering a real service to New Brunswick. Keep Tilley in the job. Mr. Dysart's only argument so far is, "Give us a chance, our promises may work." New Brunswick cannot afford to take any such chances in these perilous times.
