

Around the Maritimes

Imperial Service Medals have been awarded to 14 Nova Scotian retired employees of the Canadian National Railways in the Atlantic Region.

Employees of the city of Halifax, and the public schools of the city will have daylight saving time from midnight May 31 to midnight September 13 this year, according to a motion passed in the Halifax City Council.

Public printing cost the Province of Nova Scotia \$40,369.55 last year, according to the report tabled in the Legislature by Premier Macdonald. This was more than the estimate of \$36,600, so an order-in-council for \$4,800 was passed, it is shown.

A bill authorizing the Lieutenant-Governor-in-council to issue debentures for \$2,792,000, to redeem provincial bonds issued in 1926 and falling due on June 15, was introduced in the New Brunswick Legislature by Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer.

Common Clerk Henry D. Hopkins of Saint John, has been instructed to prepare for the Legislature a bill which would enable the water department to collect \$4,234 from the Parish of Lancaster, in connection with a water extension on the Fairville Plateau in 1931. This amount has been in dispute for some time.

Organization of the Colored Domestic Association in Halifax will be finalized within the next few days, it was stated, and a full meeting will be held later. About 15 were in attendance at the first organization meeting held at the Community church and indications were that the union would seek affiliation with local Labor unions.

An increase of ten points over last year was shown when the Halifax County Council struck the tax rate for 1936. The new rate of \$2.70 is based on an estimated expenditure of \$152,384.50, an increase of more than \$6,000 over last year's figures. The increment in the tax rate is due to a large increase in the number of institutional cases, over which the Council has no control.

Dartmouth's tax rate for 1936 took a five-point jump to \$3.60 as members of the town council met in a two-hour heated discussion recently. The rate for 1935 was \$3.55. Despite this increase, official figures showed an increase in assessments of approximately \$30,000, town officials said following the meeting. Expenditures for the year were estimated as about the same as for last year.

A resolution endorsed by the A.M.W. local 19 at North Sydney recommends that before securing a mine manager certificate, an underground manager must serve five years in that capacity. The resolution is addressed to Hon. Michael Dwyer who several days ago in the local House proposed that qualified engineers be eligible to write for manager paper without having five years experience underground.

Loans made in Nova Scotia by the Canadian Farm Loan Board have reached \$488,865, the Commons at Ottawa was informed. Total number of applications received for loans was 1,315 from inception of the board to the end of last month. Of this 373 were granted. Applications in Nova Scotia under the Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act totalled 84 from passage of the act to March 1. Total amount of liabilities involved in these was \$279,853.

Bearing a petition signed by 1,400 citizens of New Glasgow including 400 Protestants many of whom are among the largest taxpayers in the town, a Catholic

delegation appeared before the New Glasgow School Board asking for recognition of their school and thus conferring upon it the privileges and immunities of a public school. The Catholic minority are maintaining a school and educating some 400 children. It was stated, solely at their expense, constituting a burden of double taxation.

Figures received from Halifax show that imports through that port in February amounted to 37,324 tons compared with 82,431 tons at Saint John, and exports amounted to 88,683 tons compared with 172,355 tons at Saint John. In the first three months of the winter shipping season Halifax handled a total of 398,561 tons compared with 535,692 tons handled by the port of Saint John. Halifax freights in this period showed a decrease as compared with those in the same period last year, while Saint John freights showed an increase of 145,530 tons.

HEAVY FINES

London.—A fine of \$20,000 and \$525 costs was imposed on Commander Maurice Arthur Brind of Penny Compton Stables, near Leamington Spa, for customs offences in connection with the importation of horses from Ireland. Captain the Hon. Arthur Malcolm Augustus Baillie, second son of Baroness Burton, Bletchley, had also been summoned for alleged attempted fraudulent evasion of duty, but the four summonses against him were dismissed.

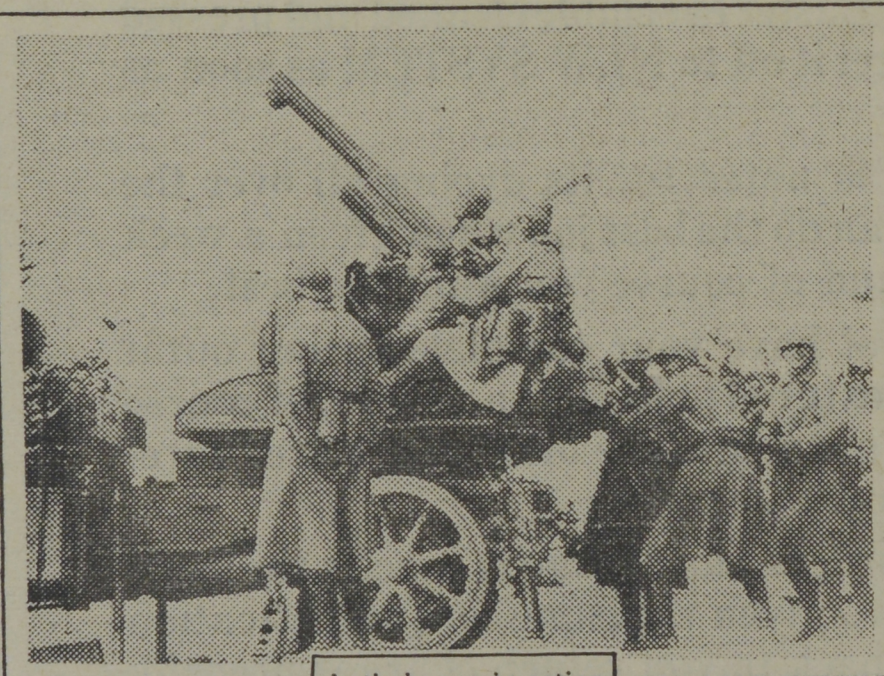
wealth and security. They have made it possible to produce more goods than we can consume.

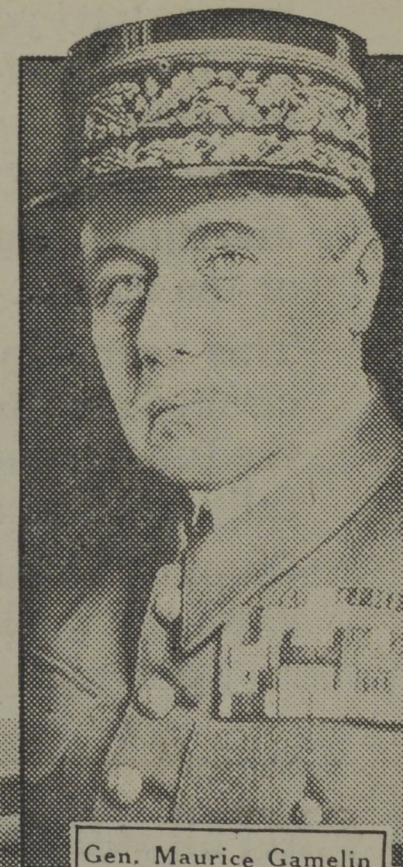

FRENCH MOBILIZE 150,000 TROOPS ON FRONTIER

Embarking for frontier

When Adolf Hitler ordered 25,000 German troops into the demilitarized Rhine frontier section, thus violating the Versailles treaty and creating a new international crisis, France retaliated by mobilizing 150,000 soldiers in eastern fortifications. Some of the troops dispatched for the famous Maginot line several weeks ago at the first indication of the impending crisis are shown em-

barking from Paris, below. France's famous line of steel and concrete underground forts, supplemented by tanks and anti-aircraft guns, such as are shown above, are commanded by General Maurice Gamelin, inset, chief of staff of the French army, which is considered Europe's strongest military machine. More troops are being sent to these fortifications.
