

Colonization Plan Is Discussed At A Meeting In Capital

Requirements For Success Are Defined by Delegates.

Fredericton, N.B.—The essential requirements for a successful colonization policy in New Brunswick are threefold: first, proper selection of land; second, adaptability of settlers; third, proper supervision by qualified government officials located in the field.

Such was the concensus of opinion resulting from the colonization conference held last week under the chairmanship of Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, in the municipal committee room in the Legislative Building.

The conference was attended by all the members of the cabinet, including Premier Dysart, who had just returned from a vacation trip in the south.

Each of those attending presented his views on the situation which crystallized into the three-point doctrine set forth above.

During the evening session, recess was taken to listen by radio to an address, delivered at the Normal School by the eminent authority, Peter Manniche, of Denmark, on "The Danish Co-operative Movement."

Britain Plans Fight Against Immigration To Sea To Save The Coastline

Beaches Are Eaten Away and Houses Far Away From Shore Are Threatened with Destruction.

London.—Gales and heavy rains have wrought such havoc on many stretches of Britain's coastline that fears are entertained for seaside highways and dwellings.

Eastbourne corporation decided to hold a conference of all the borough councils and the river catchment boards along the neighboring coast to form a scheme for keeping back the sea with a huge wall, estimated to cost thousands of pounds.

At Pevensey, near Eastborne, it is estimated that the sea has been eating into the coast at the rate of 100 yards in two years, and beaches which were popular bathing places a little while ago are no longer visible.

At St. Margaret's Bay, Kent, farther east along the coast, the

old South Foreland lighthouse, now privately owned, is only 11 feet from the edge of the cliffs.

A resident of the district said: "During the storms of the last three weeks the sea steadily washed away the foundations of the cliffs, and we fear a landslide at any moment."

On the east coast the recent frost cracked the cliffs, and the rain later had made them extremely dangerous.

S. W. Mobbs, Lowestoft borough surveyor, said: "A new wall on which we are working will cost something like \$250,000, and it should be finished by May. The storms and water from inland have played havoc with the whole

Immigration To Dominion Lower Than In Year 1935

Sun Life's Financial Statement Reveals Further Strengthening.

Ottawa.—A decrease of 9.6 per cent, was shown in immigration to Canada during 1935 compared with the previous year, according to a report issued by the Department of Immigration.

Total immigration was 11,277 against 12,476 during 1934. Of this number were from the British Isles against 2,166 the previous year, while those from other

countries totalled 3,252 compared with 3,595 in 1934.

Of those from the British Isles, 1,328 were English, 484 Scottish, 254 Irish and 37 Welsh.

Immigration of other races included 560 Hebrews, 405 Poles, 476 Ruthenians, 400 Slovaks, 333 Italians, and 230 Germans.

Immigration from the United States totalled 5,291 against 6,071 in 1934. Of this number 4,961 were Canadian-born, compared with 5,926 the previous year.
