

Conviction Under The Game Laws of New Brunswick

Department of Lands and
Mines Determined To
Enforce Law.

Fredericton, N.B. — The determination of the New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines to enforce the Game Act as provided for this Province is reflected in a conviction recently gained in a magistrate's court.

Jack Walsh, of McAdam Junction, was convicted before Magistrate C. F. Craig of a charge of killing pheasant and sentenced to 15 days confinement in the York County jail at Fredericton. Information against Walsh was laid by Constable E. Randall, Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Pheasants are protected by law in the Province of New Brunswick and the present violation is the first to come to the attention of the Department of Lands and Mines, it was stated by Lieut.-Col. H. H. Ritchie, Chief Game Warden. Considerable numbers of both the English ring-neck and the Mongolian varieties have been imported and liberated experimentally by various branches of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association and other interested groups. Both varieties seem to have become adapted to climatic and feeding conditions prevalent in New Brunswick.
