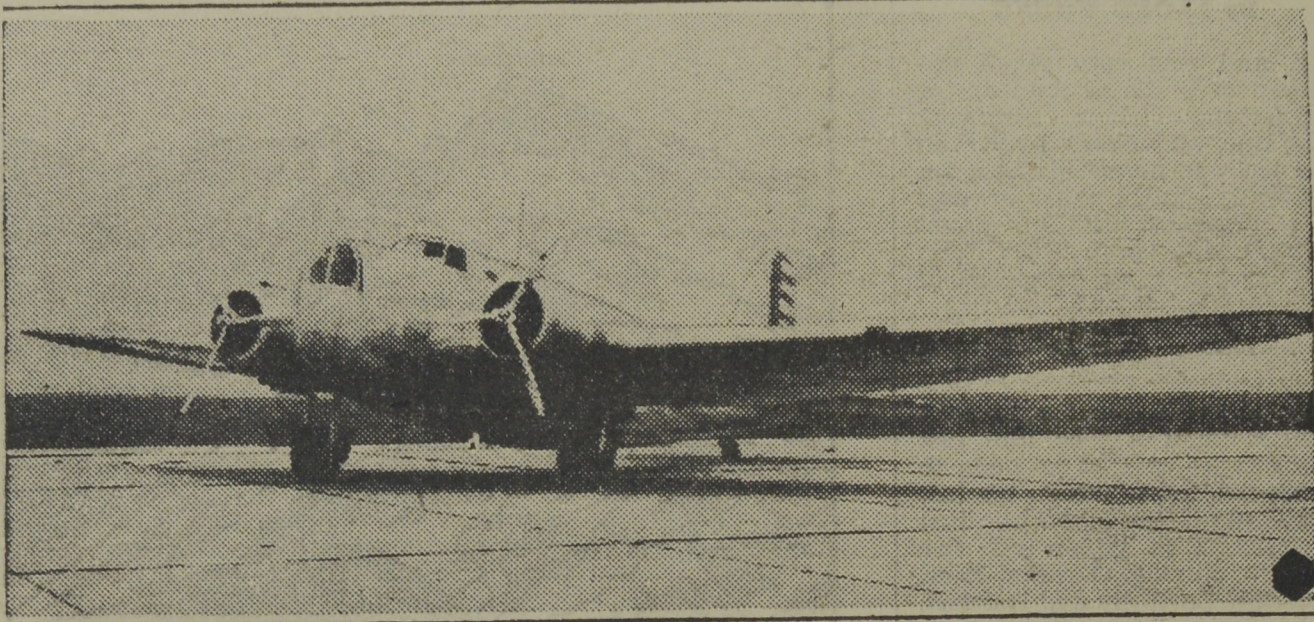

ALBERT COUNTY COUNCIL 1886

The annual session of the Albert County Council opened at the Court House on January 19, 1886. The following members comprise the council board: Alma—D. D. Lutwick, Pringle Kelly; Coverdale—Hon. James Ryan, Chambers Gaskin; Elgin—R. A. Smith, David Garland; Harvey—W. A. West, Jas. A. Smith; Hillsborough—Peter Duffy, C. J. Osman; Hopewell

—Saml. J. Calhoun, G. H. Miner.

Hon. James Ryan was elected Warden of the Municipality, W. O. Wright, Secretary-Treasurer and Hon. A. R. McClellan, County Auditor.

SHERIFF'S SALE
