

Strong Color Is Trend In Sports' Colors This Year

Pinks on Yellowish or Salmonish Casts Favorites; Pinks To Use on White.

New York—Style sleuths who are doing their stuff at Palm Beach and Miami report sports colors are strong and clear. They seem to think pinks on the yellowish or salmonish casts are the favorite pinks to use in combination with white. They send enthusiastic reports of sunny yellows, which is nothing new really, for Palm Beach has always loved to reflect its sunlight. There is considerable mention of aqua, which reminds one to mention that while navy is worn it does not seem to be as formidable a beach color as it was last season.

"ASPIRIN" TRADE MARK IS SUSTAINED IN A JUDGMENT

Ottawa.—A warning is found in the judgment just given by the Exchequer Court of Canada at Ottawa, in an action brought by the Bayer Company, Limited, owner of the trade mark "Aspirin."

The Bayer Company brought action asking a judgment of the Court restraining the defendant from infringing the trade mark by selling tablets as "Aspirin" which were not the product of The Bayer Company.

The judgment restrains the defendant permanently from putting out any of his own tablets as "Aspirin" or under any name so similar to "Aspirin" as to be confusing and awards The Bayer Company damages and costs.

The couple have 72 living descendants, another record, they believe.

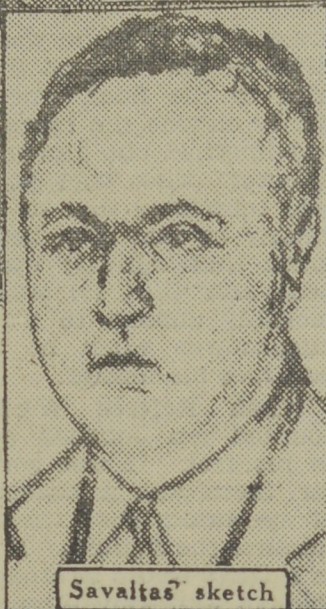
SKETCH CAUSE OF ARREST

The News On Review

Administration of Canada's penal system and possibilities of its improvement and reform will be studied by a three-man royal commission set up by order-in-council passed last week and announced by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice.

Customs and excise revenue collected at the port of Toronto in February totalled \$3,507,008, a gain of \$107,722 over February of last year. An increase in revenue for the fiscal year 1935-1936, which ends March 31, is looked for by Collector J. H. Bertram.

A report that Russia was shipping "knocked-down" submarines from Europe to her naval bases on the Pacific Ocean circulated among the members of the naval conference over the past weekend. The report stated the submarines, of various sizes, were being

hastily reassembled in the east "to meet any emergency."

J. F. Pouliot (Lib. Temiscouata) has given notice he will ask the House to declare the Canada-United Kingdom trade agreement should be revoked. For it he would substitute the 1930 amendment to the customs tariff brought down by the Liberal Government of that day and known as the "Dunning budget."

Several merchants of Sault Ste. Marie have refused to issue goods for relief vouchers until assured of payment in full when vouchers are redeemed. When November and December relief accounts were paid recently, the city paid only the Government's share of the cost, being unable to provide its 20 per cent. Efforts are being made to have the Government contribution increased.

Five hundred striking miners, carrying the body of one of their companions who died en route, arrived at Mexico City after a 13-day, 400-mile "hunger march" from Guanajuato. The miners marched to the national palace where delegates pleaded that President Cardenas intervene to settle the strike.

Effective legislation based on Judge Parker's report on the operations of the Canadian Performing Right Society will be introduced this session in the House at Ottawa. It will provide for establishment of a tribunal to review fees charged by the society for performance of copyright works of music from time to time.

To encourage design of low-cost residential houses to be built under the Dominion Housing Act, Finance Minister Dunning has announced a competition open to all architects in Canada—with 15 cash prizes ranging from \$500 to \$50. The necessary order-in-council authorizing the competition has been passed and the contest opens at once.

The American Federation of Labor has estimated the number of unemployed in the United States last January at 12,626,000 after the greatest increase from December to January in five years. "To lose ground to such an extent at this time is nothing short of tragic," the federation said in reporting its survey indicated 1,229,000 persons who had jobs in December lost them in January.

Indications of world economic recovery were seen in the increased number of orders placed at the British Industries Fair being held in London. Various sections of the fair—the largest trade show in the world—reported as high as 25 per cent. increase in sales to overseas buyers especially. More than 30 Canadian firms participated and reported much satisfaction with results.

Appointment of a special commission to deal with the entire question of relief unemployment in Ontario was urged upon the Hepburn Government in the Legislature. It was rumored later in legislative corridors that Premier Hepburn and his cabinet will consider the establishment of such an inquiry body at their next meeting.

The House at Ottawa has adopted a resolution urging study of conditions among owners of small homes, many of them forced by circumstances to see mortgages foreclosed and their dwellings sold. The resolution, sponsored by Dr. Hermas Deslaurier, Montreal Liberal, encountered no opposition, while those discussing the situation of the people it was designed to help praised it.

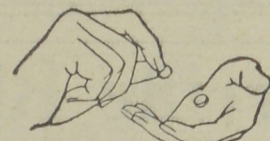
Potato growers and dealers from all over Ontario met at the Parliament Buildings in Toronto recently to consider means of protecting the growers without injury to the dealers. Discussion centered about the question of compulsory inspecting and grading. New Brunswick and Cape Breton potatoes reaching here are inspected and graded, but those produced in Ontario are not. Opinion was divided on whether it should be made compulsory.

Great Britain has moved to co-ordinate the land, sea and air defences of the Empire with official announcement of a new cabinet ministership to act for the Government defence committees. Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin announced the new official would be appointed as a minister without portfolio with the title of vice-chairman of two existing committees, the committee for Imperial defence and the committee on defence policy and requirements.

Canada's 1935 peach crop is estimated at 715,000 bushels, an advance of 75 per cent. over the 1934 crop of 407,000 bushels. The crop in Ontario was reported as 674,000 bushels, or double that of 1934. British Columbia, the other commercial peach growing area, produced 40,135 bushels. In general the quality of the 1935 crop was good and a wide market distribution was obtained. Nurserymen reported sales of 97,000 peach trees in 1934 and estimates for 1935 indicate this number has been exceeded by 40,000 trees.

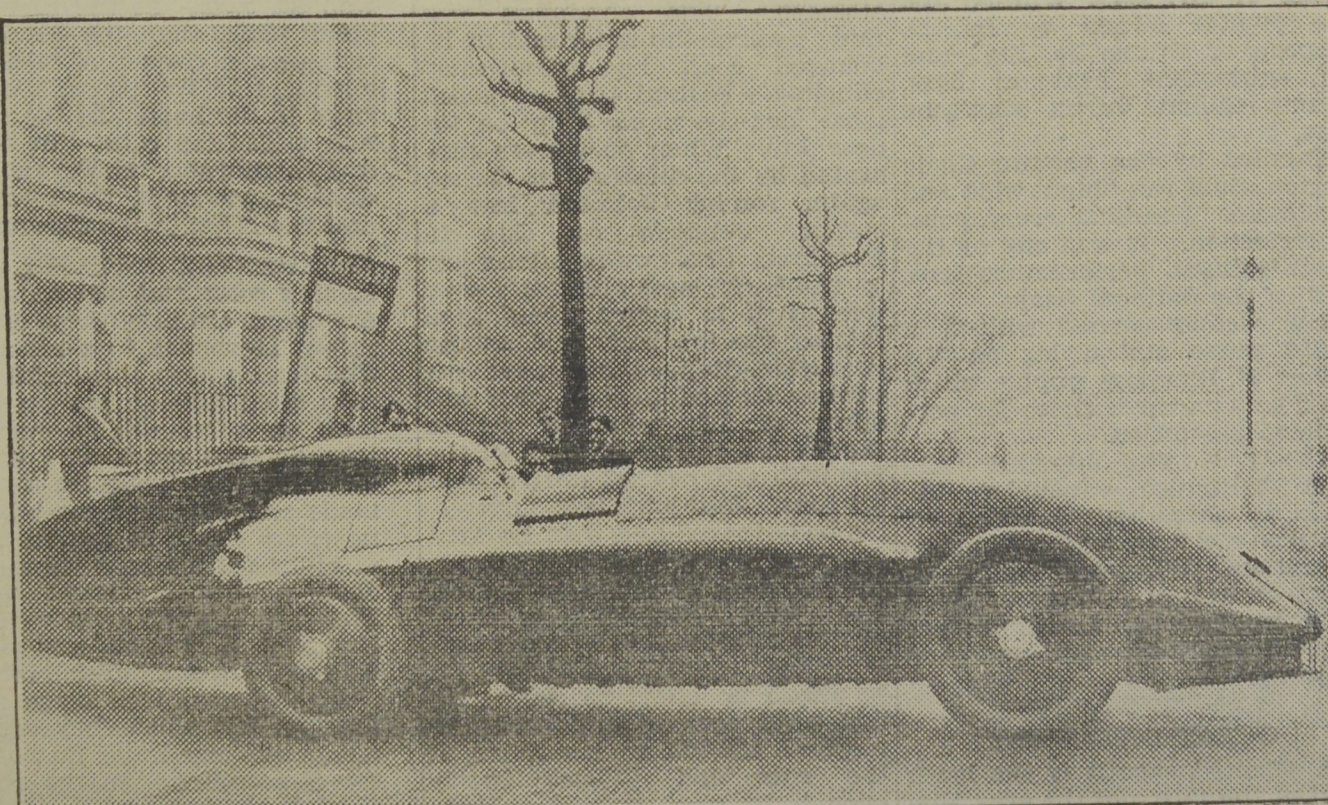
