We have received our usual supplies of Canada and Nova Scotia prints, from which it appears that our neighbours in these Provinces are behind ourselves as to European intelligence. It appears, also, that the people of Halifax, after having given full play to their emotions of joy on receiving the news from England of the proposed Colonial Trade relaxation system, are now viewing the matter calmly in its different bearings, and beginning to question its utility and advantages to Nova Scotia. So eager are they to hail any thing new (imagining that it can scarcely do them harm and is more likely to do them good in their present depressed circumstances) that they do not take time to calculate, like our Western neighbours, and thus are betrayed into sanguine expectations and extravagant rejoicings. On the *Huskissonian* system a well written and judicious paper appears in the last No. of the Nova-Scotian.—Not so transient, however, are their feelings of indignation at the late appointment to St. Paul's. Another meeting has been held and a Committee appointed to carry the new Episcopal establishment into immediate and complete effect, notwithstanding the warm expostulations of an old parishioner through the medium of the N. S. Royal Gazette, who deprecates "the building of a house of God in wrath."

We understand that His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, is expected to visit this City by the 23d inst.

We are sorry to find it generally believed, that our extensive Ship-Building concerns, while advantageous to us in one respect, are likely to be injurious to us in another. The inducements which are thereby held out to seamen to leave the vessels to which they have been attached for the voyage, and the exorbitant wages given in consequence of the very limited number of that useful class of men, operate as great discouragements in the way of freights being taken by Merchant vessels from the Mother Country for this Port. These circumstances, together with that of the great Ship Columbus being destined for this place, will we fear tend to lessen the number of our shipping this Spring.

The old Country Market House was sold at Auction last week, and may be expected to be removed immediately, when, we trust, it will be succeeded by an erection creditable to the City in respect of appearance, and commodious for the purposes intended. The Corporation deserve our thanks for their late judicious regulations respecting the *swinish* and *canine* species, the pilotage of Steam Bonts, the Ferries in the Harbour, &c. We hope they will not soon grow weary in well doing, as we are confident they will always find a community ready to appreciate their good intentions and active exertions for the public weal.

Our spring does not advance so rapidly as we once expected. Yesterday morning *hoar-frost* appeared on our fields, and to-day we have chilliness and rain. We fear that premature vegetation will receive a check.

It must be gratifying to those in this place, who knew and esteemed Capt. Piper, when he resided among us, to observe his name made honourable mention of in the latest despatches regarding the Burmese war as given in our last.

The Second Annual general meeting of the St. John Sunday School Union Society, took place on Wednesday last, at the Coffee House, in presence of a respectable assemblage of both sexes, Lieut. Col. SIMONS, President, in the Chair. The Report for last year was read by A. McLEOD, Esq. and the claims of the Institution on the continued patronage of the Public were forcibly stated by the Rev. Dr. BURNS, W. B. KINNEAR, Esq. the Rev. Messrs. ALDERMAN MILLER, &c. The Report was highly interesting and represented the Seminars as having experienced a remarkable revival in regard of the attendance of children, zeal and diligence on the part of Teachers and Superintendents, &c. It will soon be printed and will speak for itself.—Communicated.

The Hon. WARD CHIPMAN, a Judge of the Supreme Court and Speaker of the House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, is appointed by Earl Bathurst, third arbitrator under the Act for regulating the trade of the Canadas. The object of the arbitration is to settle the amount of duties to be paid by way of drawback to the Upper province for articles landed at Quebec, and consumed in Upper Canada, (Upper Canada having no seaport on the Atlantic, must necessarily transact its commercial business through the Lower province) each province chose one arbitrator, and they not having agreed upon the third, the choice has been made by the Crown, under the provision of the statute. This appointment we conceive to be most judicious, for the individual referred to, enjoys, and most deservedly so, the highest reputation for talents and integrity. Judge C. will pass this way on his route to Canada and may be shortly expected to arrive in this City.—N. Y. Albion.
