Work for the next Session of Parliament.—(From a Sunday Paper.)—**PROPOSED BILLS.**—An Act to oblige the amateurs of fat, who feed oxen on oil-cake, in future to eat of the same food themselves for twenty-one days previous to bringing their beasts to market.

An Act to oblige all master scavengers to perambulate the middle of the streets in their respective districts, in white silk stockings.

An Act to prevent persons who let their beards grow, or who wear large mustachios, from eating green peas or custard pudding.

An Act to prevent cruelty to flies, black beetles, and father long-legs.

An Act to oblige all gentlemen and modest women who go to the winter theatres, to pass blinfolld from the pay door to the boxes at half price.

An Act for the better preserving the health of his Majesty's liege subjects from the dangers too often attending exposure to wet in their feet, whereby many have grievously suffered by coughs, catarrh, and other maladies, and enacting that persons found walking in wet, damp, sloppy, greasy, splashy, dirty, mucky weather, with shoes, boots, pumps, or slippers, less than three inches thick in the sole from the heel-piece to the toe, or four inches in the heel, or with shoes of such thickness as above recited, but cracked, damaged, burst into holes, or otherwise impaired or injured, shall on conviction before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, be sentenced to the tread mill.

An Act regulating the size and weight of penny plum buns.

An Act to prevent persons from sleeping, snoring, or dozing in church.

An Act for the encouragement of all rude fellows shouldering and pushing men, women, and children off the broad pavement into the sweeping of the street.

An Act to oblige persons, for their own safety, to walk in the filthy streets, and to give butchers with their trays, persons carrying loads, baskets and barrow-woman, sweeps and bakers, the right of passage alone on the broad pavement.

An Act to prevent cruelty to visitors, prohibiting the galloping of young children admitted after dinner over the small clothes of visitors, spilling their wine eating their fruit, fouling their waist coats, ruining their neckcloths, kicking their shins, and calling them names, bawling, squalling, crying, roaring, or singing or spouting at the request of their parents or guardians.

We have received our regular files of Colonial and American Papers; they contain no foreign intelligence of a later date, than we were previously in possession of.

We have the pleasure of observing our worthy Governor, His Excellency Sir Howard Douglas, in his recent tour through the Province, has been received with that respect and esteem, due his rank and high talents.—His progress has been marked by usefulness. By applying his profound knowledge of Political and domestic economy to raise the energies of all classes, to the improvement of their natural and local advantages, he has gained their admiration, and at the same time won their hearts by his affability, and the interest he takes in their concerns.—These are the true means for advancing the improvement, the importance and character of the Province; and we trust the results will bring home to the heart of this distinguished individual, all the happiness which springs from the luxury of doing good.

MR. PEMBERTON.

The Inhabitants of this City who had assembled last evening in "the Amateur Theatre," to witness Mr. Pemberton's "exertion of all the strength he possesses," were much disappointed by the non-appearance of that gentleman. Mr. P. however, cannot be blamed, as the Steam Boat from Fredericton, whence he was expected, has not yet arrived.

The Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, for ascertaining the most eligible spot whereon to erect a Light House on Grand Manan, left town on Monday last, in the Revenue Cutter Elizabeth, for that purpose, and returned again on Thursday. We

understand that the site fixed upon by these gentlemen, is the GANNETT ROCK, which lies about six miles from the main Island, and has a surface of nearly an acre; so that vessels when making the Light will be clear of those dangerous Ledges which lie in that vicinity. The following description of the Manan Ledges is taken from Lockwood's Nova-Scotia, and will be found substantially correct:—"The most dangerous is the Old Ledge, or Proprietor, spreading a space of half an acre at low water. When covered, the tide runs directly over it, at the rate of four knots. From the Gannett, it is N. 82 E. seven miles. Three miles N. E. from the Old Ledge, lies Clerk's Ground: and East from it, nearly four miles, lies the Roaring Bull, a bank with eight fathoms water, causing an extremely heavy and dangerous ripple. The s. w. head open of the Three Islands, or rather the s. w. head kept open of all other land, will lead clear to the southward of these dangers. The North-eastermost high land, open of the little lumps of Islands which shew themselves on the east side of the Manan, will clear to the Eastward of them. In easterly winds the tide rips are impassable.—South of the s. w. point of White-head Island lies a range of rocks with deep water between them, but causing a continued rip, three miles from the shore, home to the Long Point.—They are the Tinker, Three Diamonds, Rans, with many others unnamed. Some shew themselves, others have three and seven feet on them. The Three Islands, the southermost of the cluster of Manan, are low and ledgy. The East side of the largest is bold, to the Rocks that appear at all times. Off their s. w. sides a sunken ledge lies, called the Constable, dry at low water. S. s. w. of the three Isles, four miles, is the Gannett, a small Rock, forty feet above the sea: this being dry in all weathers, and near all the dangerous rocks, would be a fine situation for a Light House, and save many ships. It has a number of small ledges and sunken rocks about it, that are always breaking."—*Courier.*

MIRAMICHI, JULY 20.

St. James's Church, Newcastle.—On Thursday the 14th instant, at 5 o'clock, P. M. (in the presence of a very numerous assemblage of people) was laid the Corner-Stone of this Church, by His Excellency Major-General Sir Howard Douglas, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. (then at Miramichi on his tour through the Province,) at the particular request of the Committee appointed to erect the Church. After the solemn form of laying the Corner-Stone of this hallowed building, with the usual ceremonies, were gone through, His Excellency was pleased to express himself as follows:—"I have much pleasure in laying the Corner-Stone of that foundation upon which is to be raised, a Church, in communion with the established Church of Scotland, according to that ecclesiastical constitution which is recognized by law.—Long may it rear its sacred roof over a Congregation of moral religious and loyal People; may it ever remind them of the land of their sires; keep them in connection with the national Church with which it is in communion, and retain them in allegiance to the illustrious Empire, of which our Country (Scotland) forms so important a part.—may God favor all endeavours to these effects and bless you and your Descendants."—

In a small chamber of depository in the Corner Stone, made for the purpose, were deposited several bottles, containing British and Provincial Newspapers, Gold and Silver Coins of the Present reign, and several other antique and curious Coins. A small metal Table was also deposited, on which was engraved the following inscription:—"The Corner Stone of the Foundation of this Church of St. James, Dedicated to the Worship of Almighty God, According to the Forms of the Established CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, Was laid on the XIV. Day of July, Anno Domini MDCCCXXXV. By His Excellency Major-General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Baronet, F. R. S. & Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the PROVINCE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK, &c. &c. &c.
