LONDON.
OFFICIAL.

By an Act of Parliament passed this session it is enacted, that from and after the 10th of Oct. 1825, printed Newspapers and other printed Publications, liable to the Stamp Duties, may be sent to any of His Majesty's Colonies or Possessions beyond Seas by the Packet Boats, upon the payment of One Penny Half-penny for every such Paper.—That payment to be made at the time the Newspaper is put into the Post—provided the same be sent in covers open at the sides, and be put into the Post Office in any Town in Great-Britain or Ireland, on the day on which the same shall be published, such day to be ascertained by the date of the papers.

Also Newspapers printed in the colonies may be sent (in covers open at the sides) by the Packets to Great Britain and Ireland, for the Postage of Three-pence on each Paper, to be paid by the Persons to whom the same may be addressed.

If any other Paper or thing whatsoever be enclosed or concealed in such printed papers, or there shall be any writing, other than the Superscription, upon such papers or their covers, they are to be charged with treble the Postage of a Letter.

And if any papers sent from Great Britain and Ireland which are liable to the Stamp Duties are not duly stamped, they are to be stopped and sent to the Commissioners of Stamps.

Also if they are not put into the Post Office on the day of their date, they are to be charged with a single rate of Postage.

Newspapers published on Sunday, may be sent as above if put in on the ensuing day.

This act does not oblige Persons to send printed Papers to or from the Colonies through the Post Office.

July 6.

The Foreign news of the week is confined to a confirmation of the success of the Turks at Navarino, and of their more than equivalent disaster in the harbour of Modon. On the one side, the Infidels have obtained possession of the empty ruins of an inconsiderable fortress; while, on the other, they have lost their whole fleet of fifty ships, upon which alone they could depend for reinforcements, or supplies of warlike stores and ammunition, and what is of still more importance, for provisions to support their army in a hostile and unproductive country.

The latest French papers are filled with animadversions upon the disgrace of M. Hyde de Neuville, the Ambassador at the Court of Lisbon. The key of this intrigue has not yet reached England, but it may be, we believe, presumed, that the ascendancy of the British influence, in the Councils of Portugal, and the corresponding decline of the French manifested in the late commercial and colonial arrangements of the Portuguese Government, constitute the chief part of the Minister's delinquency.

JULY 15.

The French occupation of Spain was one of the last matters of public importance, and the very last connected with the foreign interests of the country, respecting which an explanation was demanded in Parliament. The Secretary for foreign affairs declared that there was no ground of apprehension, as he had received satisfactory assurances, and so forth. It appears, however, from the French papers, and from private accounts, that the French consider themselves quite at home at Cadiz. The transaction is not very minutely, or perhaps quite correctly detailed, but it may be reduced to this, that the French flag has usurped authority in matters of international communication at Cadiz; and that the Captain of an English frigate—who, by the bye, bears a name ominous in this instance, as well as heroic—refused to acknowledge any other flag than the Spanish in a Spanish port. To this may be added, that the Captain of a French brig, on duty at the mouth of the bay, sent a message, which under other circumstances, would be impertinent, but addressed to the Captain of an English frigate was burlesque—asking who had the temerity to board an English packet without his leave. This business is no doubt, not yet terminated. It is hardly to be supposed that Captain Rodney acted without express orders from the Admiralty. The contingency was so obvious upon the French occupation of Cadiz, naval as well as military, that it must have been anticipated and instructions given accordingly.

HOUSE OF LORDS, JULY 17.

PROROGATION OF PARLIAMENT.

This being the day appointed for the prorogation of Parliament, several Peers entered the House shortly before three o'clock, but the attendance was by no means so numerous as might have been expected, if His Majesty had been present on the occasion. The Lords Commissioners were, the Lord Chancellor, the Earl of Westmoreland, the Earl of Harrowby, the Earl of Liverpool and the Earl of Shaftesbury. These Noble Lords, and some others, appeared in their Robes; and on the Benches on the Opposition side were observed several Ladies of distinction, who seemed to regard the imposing scene with earnest curiosity. At three o'clock precisely, the Lords Commissioners being seated on the Woolsack, the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod conducted the Speaker of the House of Commons to the Bar. The Right Hon. Gentlemen were attended but by very few of the Members, and after some routine business was gone through, and the Royal Assent given by Commission, to several Bills, the Lord Chancellor delivered the following Speech on the part of His Majesty:—

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The business of the Session being now brought to a conclusion, we are commanded by His Majesty to express the great satisfaction which he feels in releasing you from your laborious attendance in Parliament.

His Majesty returns you his warmest acknowledgments for the zeal and assiduity with which you have prosecuted your enquiries into the state of Ireland, which he recommended to you at the opening of the Session.

It is a particular gratification to His Majesty, that the tranquillity and improved condition of that part of the United Kingdom have rendered the extraordinary powers with which you had invested His Majesty no longer necessary for the public safety.

His Majesty is happy to be able to announce to you, that he receives from all foreign Powers the strongest assurances of their friendly disposition towards this country, and of their desire to maintain the general peace.

While His Majesty regrets the continuance of the war in the East Indies by the Burmese Government, he trusts that the gallant exertions of the British and native forces employed in operations in the enemy's territory may lead to a speedy and satisfactory termination of the contest.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We have it in command from His Majesty to thank you for the supplies you have granted to him for the service of the present year, and at the same time to express the satisfaction he derives from the reduction you have found it practicable to make in the burthens of his People.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

His Majesty has commanded us to assure you, that he is highly sensible of the advantages which must result from the measures you have adopted, in the course of this Session for extending the commerce of his subjects, by the removal of unnecessary and inconvenient restrictions, and from the beneficial relaxation which you have deemed it expedient to introduce into the Colonial system of this country.

These measures, His Majesty is persuaded, will evince to his subjects in these distant possessions the solicitude with which Parliament watches over their welfare; they tend to cement and consolidate the interests of the Colonies with those of the Mother Country; and His Majesty confidently trusts that they will contribute to promote that general and increasing prosperity on which His Majesty had the happiness of congratulating you on the opening of the present Session, and which, by the blessing of Providence, continues to pervade every part of his Kingdom. The Lord Chancellor then prorogued Parliament to Thursday, the 25th August.

FOREIGN.

THE GREEKS.

The following is sent to us by the Greek Deputies: Extract of an official Proclamation to the Greek Government.

"Thanks to God! The enemy's fleet that made its appearance off Cape d'Oro, threatened so much to attack the Islands of Hydra and Spezzia, that the Government thought it necessary to order the troops that were at Napoli di Romania to be sent there, in order to defend this bulwark of our independence. The afore-said fleet, consisting of 100 sail, between men-of-war and transports, and which was carrying troops and all kinds of war and ammunition and provisions, in order to effect the ruin of Greece, has been completely defeated by our brave sailors off Cape d'Oro and Andros, between the 20th and 21st of May, O. S. The proud Captain Pacha succeeded with much difficulty in effecting his escape with only twenty-seven ships, still followed by the second division of the Greek fleet under Sacktoory. The Admiral's ship, which was the largest amongst the enemy's fleet, was burnt; but the Captain Pacha was not found on board, he knowing by experience that the Greeks attacked generally the ship on board of which he was. Another frigate of a smaller dimension, has also been burnt in the engagement; and several other men-of-war, having been dispersed and chased by the Greeks, ran ashore on the islands of Syra and Tyros. A great number of transports had been captured and brought into the islands of Hydra and Spezzia. The Admiral Miaulis, informed at Mitos, of the glorious engagement of Sacktoory, hastened to the spot in pursuit of the rest of the enemy's fleet, which it was fully anticipated would have met the same fate."

Our latest English dates are to the 17th ult. The new Colonial Trade Bill has been received at Halifax in manuscript. The Act goes into operation on the 5th January next. His Excellency Sir James Kempt returned in the Packet, and has been received by all ranks with heartfelt congratulations. He has been absent from the Province for sixteen months.

The Supreme Court in this City has not yet closed.—The most important criminal trials came before it on Saturday last—the one was the case of Sarah Pitts, a coloured woman from Loch Lomond charged with the crime of murdering her illegitimate child, by allowing it to perish through neglect. The Jury found a verdict finding her guilty of murdering the child.—The other case was that of the Artilleryman who was charged with the murder of one of his comrades as stated in the Star about 2 months ago. The Jury found a verdict of Murder.

ANDROIDES.—We find that Mr. Haddock has been prevailed upon to exhibit two nights more, (this and to-morrow Evening); this must be an accommodation to many, who put off their visit till last night, when they could not obtain room. We perceive y Mr. H's advertisement, that he visits Halifax, where no doubt he will be well received.

On Thursday arrived at this port, the new and handsome Brig *Androp*, of 300 tons, built at Dorchester, for Mr. Robert Stirling, of this City.

The Foundation Stone of a New Church for the Rev. Alexander Fletcher has lately been laid in London. It will be in the recollection of our readers, that Mr. F. was ejected from the Communion of the Church of Scotland, on account of his conduct to Miss Dick, his congregation thinking that he was treated tyrannically, and an injured man, have erected this building for his accommodation.—*New-Scotian*.

The answer returned was, that "The Commanding Officer of his Britannic Majesty's frigate Active, agreeably to and in conformity with Admiralty orders dared to board his Majesty's packet, and would every other English vessel which should enter the Bay of Cadiz during her stay there whether it should or should not be agreeable to the French Commander."

The French took offence, and they now say they will put up no longer with such insults, but that their orders must be implicitly obeyed.

The Active leaves this to-morrow for her destination. All on board in perfect health.
