

ly be enabled to announce that a Royal Charter will be granted to this Company.

The purpose of the Company is,— 1st, To purchase such Portions of Crown and Clergy Reserves as Government may be induced to dispose of; and to make any other Acquisitions of Land that may be deemed advisable to the Company.

2dly, To prepare for the Settlement of Emigrants, or other Persons, by the immediate clearing of the lands and by the erection of buildings, farm-houses, &c. either for the purposes of sale, or the occupation of tenants.

3dly, As a further encouragement to Settlers, to make advances of Capital, at the legal rate of interest in the colony, to such persons as shall require the same, the necessary securities being always given to the Company.

4thly, To give the most accurate information to all persons intending to emigrate from this country; to afford them every facility in the transmission of their funds; and to adopt means for securing them a passage on the most moderate terms.

5thly, To embrace every object tending to promote the prosperity and advancement of the Colony, whether by agricultural improvements, by inland communications, the encouragement of steam navigation, or any other purposes adapted to the views of the Company.

Disent from the Church.—It appears that last Mail brought intelligence to Halifax of the confirmation of the Rev. Mr. WILLIS's appointment to St. Paul's Church in that Town, and that in consequence a large body of the parishioners immediately resolved to build by subscription an Episcopal Chapel, with the right of electing their own Minister, which subscription is rapidly filling up. This new institution will be something anomalous, as it is intended to be of the communion of the Church of England, while at the same time it will be to all intents and purposes a dissenting Chapel. The following Resolutions were passed at a Parish Meeting at Halifax on Thursday the 14th inst.

Resolved,—That the parish continue to entertain a high sense of the importance of the right of presentation to the Rectory of St. Paul as hitherto exercised by the parishioners; and they do hereby sanction as necessary and proper, the proceedings which have been pursued for the protection of that right by the parishioners, the church-wardens and vestry.

Resolved,—That the parish entertaining a warm attachment for his most gracious Majesty's person and government, repel as entirely unwarranted, the imputation of disloyalty which has been attempted to be cast upon them in those proceedings; and they are persuaded, that nothing but great misrepresentations could have induced His Majesty's Government to refuse to the Parish the free exercise of their right of Presentation to the Rectory, as made vacant by Dr. Inglis's resignation.

Resolved,—That although under the circumstances in which the Parish is placed, there seems little prospect of successfully opposing, in any quarter the strong power by which, without any fair hearing, or investigation, their just claim is violently threatened to be borne down, and therefore they feel themselves unwillingly compelled to discontinue a contest rendered unequal only by the superior influence opposed to them, yet being determined, as far as is in their power, to preserve their privilege, and the benefits of its exercise, it is the sense and determination of the parish as expressed at this meeting, to withdraw from St. Paul's Church, and not to enter into the compulsory connection attempted to be established between them and the gentleman forced upon them as Rector, contrary to their sentiments; and immediately to procure another place for Divine Worship, which may be put under such regulations as will secure to them their reasonable privileges, always esteemed valuable, but especially under the present circumstances of the Parish.

Resolved,—That the Parish entertain the most grateful sense of the Rev. Mr. Twining's kindness in hitherto performing the duties of the Parish, and of the zealous and faithful manner in which he has discharged the arduous service thereby imposed on him; and they sincerely regret the circumstances which make it necessary for him to cease the exercise of his functions as Assistant Missionary in St. Paul's Church.

Resolved,—That a copy of the last Resolution be presented to the Rev. Mr. Twining, accompanied by the sincere thanks of the Parish for his valuable services since he has been connected with the Parish together with the most affectionate assurances of their warm attachment to him and high esteem of his character and conduct.

The meeting then adjourned until Wednesday next, for the purpose of making the assessment for the present year, and of considering a tender of resignation by the Church wardens.—A. Recorder. The Rev. Dr. Inglis was to be consecrated Bishop on the 29th ult.

The late Session of the Legislature of Nova-Scotia has closed without any encouragement having been given to the Fisheries. The Grammar School Act of that Province expires this year, and no provision has been made for the future support of these Institutions.

The annual Sermon in aid of the Sunday School Union Society, will be Preached on Sunday evening next, in the Baptist Chapel at six o'clock, in the evening. It is hoped that the liberality which hitherto has characterised the Inhabitants of Saint John, will be realized on the present occasion.
