False Alarm. There was a false alarm of fire last night.

Potatoes. A Gibson farmer lately lost 50 barrels of potatoes. They were put in the cellar in bins, and having been taken from wet (interior) ground, rot set in, and with the exception of those nearest the outside were all destroyed.

Runaway. A horse belonging to Mr. Wm. Scully ran away yesterday afternoon. Mr. Scully and the young lad with him were thrown to the ground. Mr. Scully was bruised considerably and has not been able to get out since.

Good Prospects. Applications for timber licenses are pouring rapidly into the Crown Land Office. The quantity of timber lands applied for this year at the present time, is almost double what it was last year. This speaks well for a revival in the lumber trade.

Personal. The Surveyor General is the only member of the Government in the city now, and there are enough settlers with complaints and requests perpetually hovering around him to keep twenty men busy. There are few he sends away rejoicing, but most he dismisses satisfied.

Mr. W. B. Mills has returned to Beau fort. On Tuesday last Walter G. Dunn, 30 years of age, son of John Dunn, of Port Lorne, started from home with a bad forger drift sword, taking with him his gun. He placed the gun in the bow of the boat and in pushing out from the wharf the gun was accidentally discharged, the contents entered the arm at the wrist, coming out below the elbow. Five inches of one of the bones was torn away, and the arteries severed. The young man walked three miles through bogs and ponds to a house. The arm was amputated, but Dunn only lived a few hours afterwards.—Ez.

N. E. R. The New Brunswick Railway Co. have decided to put up a number of wood-sheds at suitable points along the line. These points will probably be Upper Keewick's Millville, Woodstock Junction, Florenceville, Munnac, Aroostook, Carleton, Grand Falls and Edmundston. (The stations marked by an asterisk are to be attended to first.) Two have been already built at Gibson. They are to be 20 feet wide and from 100 to 200 feet in length, and will be let out by contract.

Business. Mr. R. S. Bulley of St. Mary's has lately done quite a business in the potato line. During the fall he has shipped about 500 barrels to St. John and American ports, and has now on hand accumulated in huge bins at his warehouses over 70 tons or 850 barrels of potatoes, consisting of such sterling qualities as the Early Rose, Prolific, (Molhawk) and Susies. These are all intended for American markets. Mr. John Neill of Gibson informs us that in a few days he will send off 100 barrels, and other farmers in the neighborhood lesser quantities. As far as we can learn from these gentlemen and other competent persons there seems to be a fair profit obtained on this article when sent to the United States, and when the country people have got over their ideas respecting a probable rise in this produce during the coming winter, more potatoes will be brought to town, and our big shippers will be able to carry on profitably a larger business. As it is now, there is a great disadvantage among our farmers to dispose of their potatoes at the prevailing rates, except among those who are absolutely compelled to do so.

Communications. ST. CECILIA'S DAY AT ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE. To the Editor of the STAR: SIR,—No doubt the many lovers of music throughout Canada will be pleased to learn that the feast of their patroness, St. Cecilia, was celebrated in a worthy manner in St. Joseph's College, Memramcook.

Early on Saturday, the 22nd inst., the bustle and preparations of the students proclaimed that a festival of no common importance was to be commemorated. The Angelus Bells, from the tower of the Church of St. Thomas, pealed forth a merry chime as the students proceeded to the College Chapel, the altar of which was very tastefully arranged with flowers and beautiful miniature lamps. A Grand High Mass was sung by the Very Rev. Superior, Father Lefebvre, after which he delivered an eloquent paenegyric on the feast of the day. In the afternoon, the Philharmonic Society, on the invitation of the Rev. Superior, sat down to a banquet. The tables were laden with everything that could tempt the palate, and notwithstanding that students are proverbially bashful, they made the acquaintance of many of the rare dishes.

The concert in the evening, however, was justly looked forward to as the part of the day's festivities. At seven o'clock, the doors of the large Exhibition Hall were opened, and half an hour after, a very respectable audience rose to greet the opening piece. The College Band played in a very creditable manner, a march, composed by Prof. Ringuette, the musical portion of the programme consisted of several vocal and instrumental solos, duets, glee, etc., all of which were rendered to the entire satisfaction of the audience, who testified, by frequent applause, to their appreciation of the efforts of the young gentlemen. The splendid performance of the College Orchestra was one of the most pleasing features of the evening. The orchestra is under the leadership of Prof. E. Ringuette, and certainly the performance reflected much credit on that gentleman's genius and exertions in his profession. A "Political Speech" was followed by a comedy, illustrating the true, but ever true saying, that "Honesty is the best policy." The acting of Mr. H. R. O'Connor was excellent; and without wishing to make any individual distinction, he was, in our opinion, the most accomplished person of character that has appeared on this stage for some time. Mr. Charles J. O'Reilly also did very well. This young gentleman possesses a clear, musical voice, that sends a thrill to the hearer, and commands attention. The favorite with the audience, however, seemed to be Mr. Foster Duffly. His very appearance was the signal for hearty, genuine applause, while his drolleries and eccentricities elicited peals of laughter. Mr. T. Roche also made a decidedly good impression, and his acting was well assisted by Messrs. Harnett, Walsh, Murray and Murphy. At the conclusion of the programme, the Very Rev. Superior complimented the students, and expressed himself highly pleased with the whole performance. A vote of thanks was then tendered by the audience, and the services fell upon one of the best seasons ever held in Memramcook.

A TRUE WARNING. (From Mind and Matter.) To the Editor of the STAR: SIR,—The real deleterious nature of tobacco is not known by its consumers. Its poison is odorless, although it always gives warning by its diffusive presence, which odor is disgusting and sickening to a sensitive person, and often produces convulsions in children which terminates in death. When a man has formed the habit of using tobacco he has relinquished his will power, that very power by which all the faculties of his mind are governed, and he is a slave to a poison that diffuses itself through his body and all its surroundings, and is again absorbed by his wife and children in the form of nicotine, which is the most virulent of all poisons.

Many persons smoke in their houses and some smoke and chew in bed, consequently the house, furniture and clothing become saturated with nicotine, and when the wife and children have absorbed it in a certain quantity it is as sure to produce death as sewer gas, and just as unconsciously it becomes absorbed. Nearly every one has hereditary tendencies to disease, Scrophulous, Consumption, or Neuritis, and wherever these exist this nicotine lays hold, and its culmination is death. Every person has a magnetic atmosphere which extends from two to four feet from the body, and if the magnetic atmosphere is poisoned by tobacco that poison is taken into the system of persons who associate with, and the secret effect of this poison is more deleterious than the first, and it is only a question of time when the unconscious victim will succumb to disease and death without the man or woman having any knowledge of the cause. Even many professional men do not understand the deleterious effects of nicotine. There was a dentist who put it in the teeth of a man that had used tobacco for thirty years, and in less than half an hour afterwards this man fell on the sidewalk and remained insensible for hours.

The temperance movers are aware of the deleterious effects of alcohol, because they are so apparently, but the great Red Ribbon movement is dumb on the subject of a greater evil. Perhaps they do not know that the use of tobacco is a form of intemperance, which destroys the comfort, the health, and the lives of innocent persons. A person who has formed the habit of using either opium or tobacco is not more temperate than one who drinks alcohol. Tobacco has done more to deteriorate and demoralize the present generation, than any other form of intemperance. ESCULAPIUS.
