

## Local Matters.

### The Market.

People refused to buy beef this morning in market at 3 and 4 cents per pound.

### Crown Lands—A Good Sign.

Application for timber berths are pouring rapidly into the Crown Lands office.

### Reform Club Band.

### The Rink.

The Rink was flooded on Thursday. We had almost begun to think that warm weather was to be soon at hand from this healthful recreation of skating.

### N. E. P.

The Aroostook Starch Manufacturer Company are shipping into Woodstock for the United States, via the New Brunswick Railway, daily, five carloads of starch.

### On the Stocks.

No. 4 locomotive, that was upset last week on the line, is being repaired. It is undergoing a course of repairs at the machine shop. The tender and cab were damaged to the extent of \$150.

### Contract.

Several carloads of lumber have been forwarded by the New Brunswick Railway this week for the lumber sheds that are to be put up along the line. The two which are to be put up at Woodstock Junction will be under the direction of Mr. Robt. Logan of Marysville.

### On Dit.

That Mr. Wm. Richards left here a day or two ago for Dalhousie. It is stated that the object of his visit is the purchase of the Moffitt mills and premises. It is true we have to congratulate Restigouche on this acquisition to its business spirit.

### The Woodcock Bridge.

The ice has somewhat damaged one of the piers of the Woodcock bridge. Mr. E. H. Hoan who went up the line yesterday to examine the extent of the injury says that the pier has sunk some and shifted several inches from its position.

### Benevolence.

The Reform Club Band that so generously offered their services at the late concert of the Industrial School, brought in an amount of \$16 to the directors. It is but fair to say that the majority of the Band discontemned this means.

### Big Figs.

Mr. Benjamin Close, of Gibson, lately killed four hogs whose combined weight was 1975 pounds. The largest of the quartette was two years old, and kicked the beam at the unprecedented weight of 755 pounds. His tusks were six inches long, and he made over three barrels of pork.

### Cask.

Cask fishing has commenced. A lad living at Morrison's Mill brought a cask in town Thursday weighing ten pounds. Mr. Fred Robinson, of Douglas, has also made a big catch. Just before the ice ran out he set twenty lines, and caught ten, aggregating forty pounds, the largest one weighing ten pounds.

### A Bear Fight.

It is rumored about Gibson, with what degree of truth is not yet apparent, that an old hunter, Hugh McDermott, while engaged in a tussle with a bear just above Stanley, had his left arm broken in two places, but managed to dispatch the monster with his jack knife. We can give the names of half a dozen references for the above, yet we don't believe it.

### A Yankee Uxas.

An embargo demanding 25 per cent. of the value of each Canadian horse that crosses into the State of Maine, whether intended for sale or not, came into effect December 1st. On being apprised of the fact, our lumbermen conducting operations in Aroostook County, hurried their animals across the lines to the estimated number of 400 to avoid the tariff.

### The Starch Industry.

The Starch Manufacturers of Aroostook County, Maine, have closed their operations for this season. Each factory has probably made about 400 tons of starch. There are twenty-three factories in Aroostook County, so that the total product may be put down as 9,000 tons, most of which was shipped via N. B. R. to the United States.

### Fredericton Branch Railway.

Beginning with Thursday last, trains will run as follows: Leave Fredericton 7 a. m. and 2.30 p. m. for St. John; 9 a. m. for Fredericton and Junction and the West. Leave St. John 7.45 and 4 p. m. for Fredericton, and 3.35 for Fredericton Junction, after connecting with train from the West. Train due at Fredericton at 11.30 a. m. and 4.40 and 7.40 p. m.

### Garbion.

Messrs. Frank Hazen and Chris. Robinson of St. John crossed the river yesterday en route for Harwood Bridge, Gaspeaux, Kings County, 40 miles out the Little River road. "Sachem Gabriel" and "Jim Paul" accompanied the party with provisions, material and spiritual, for a 15-day cruise. They intend to camp at the cranberry plains where garbion are accustomed to resort at this time of year.

### Presque Isle.

Matters in reference to the new Branch Railway are still impending. The Presque Isle people are exasperated at the indifference of their neighbors in the town of Marysville, and the Railway Company have decided not to take any further steps in the matter until the amount asked for is subscribed. One thing seems certain, that as long as Presque Isle remains without a railway Caribou will be the head quarters of the up river trade.

### S. S. Concert.

The Methodist Sabbath School Concert Tuesday evening, in the vestry of the church on Carleton Street, was a very enjoyable and successful affair. About four hundred persons were present, and the juvenile songsters acquitted themselves in a very creditable manner. The proceeds amounted to \$32. Another affair of the same kind is contemplated, which, if carried out, will take place shortly after New Years.

### New Mill.

Messrs. J. A. Hurd and F. A. Wood are putting up a large shingle mill on the Little Madawaska Stream, Aroostook County, Me. The region round about probably affords a better chance for the successful carrying out of such an enterprise than any place in either Maine or New Brunswick. The cedars grow to an immense size and are particularly celebrated for their shingles and grafts.

## TRADE.

As may be seen elsewhere in our local page the Aroostook starch factories have suspended operations, having manufactured more starch this season than in any one year before. The live Yankee has always been a subject of ridicule by far less active Canadians, but it does seem that in every project, every embarkation in business enterprise, the former is at the bottom of it. Across the line, factories and mills and taneries are every day being erected. With us it is usually different. There seems to be a spirit of diffidence in such matters as require enterprise, a disposition to hold off a while and see how affairs are going to act. And it would be an unrea-sonable to assign as a reason for this, the physical disadvantages of the border counties as it would be to say that it is the result of ignorance or national sluggishness.

And yet in these two countries, physically so similar, and inhabited by the descendants of the same Anglo-Saxon stock, being so radically different in all that pertains to commercial activity, there must be some great, some all-prevailing reason assignable. Whatever it is to be done in the way of uplifting Canada from the position of a mere receptacle for American manufactures, must be accomplished by placing the struggling industries of our country on a level with those who, by the same admission, that came into being over six years ago, were enabled to command the markets of Canada; and this has been done. Now we can see no reason why manufacturers of every description suitable to the climate could not be sustained in New Brunswick. We believe they may be, and predict they shall be. Madawaska and Victoria Counties are capable of raising 20 bushels of potatoes to the acre more than Aroostook County, Maine. Let Starch Factories be established, and let suitable encouragement be given to that industry which brings into the pockets of American speculators \$900,000 every year; and instead of seeing 50 carloads of American Manufactured Starch pouring into Woodstock per week, we shall see employment afforded to thousands of people and a thousand avenues provided for the development of the industry of our country. On this subject more anon.

### "LET ALL THINGS BE DONE DECENTLY AND IN ORDER."

To the Editor of the STAR:

SIR,—If the committee of the Odd-fellows Bazaar look for a happy termination to their undertaking, it would be prudent on their part, without delay, to prevent the unauthorized canvass for lotteries (and even authorized, in this earliest stage of their work such a step would be inadvisable), for we learn that the Bazaar or Fair does not come off until June next; also that those in charge of affairs have passed no resolution to the effect that they will have Lotteries at all. It is a matter for future consideration entirely. We can detect a feeling that is characteristic of the group of re-fused ladies composing the committee of management. We respect them for the same, and earnestly hope that the finale to their efforts, may prove prolific of gain. With such wishes and at the instigation of friendly prompters from whom my cue is taken, I write to warn the ladies of the Bazaar Committee that unless immediate measures are adopted to prevent any such wide awake merchandise as the sale of Lottery tickets (or rather numbers), among their invited guests at the sewing circle, there will be a thinning out of visitors and kindly interested friends, who would when the correct time arrives, become liberal purchasers. Who ever heard of pushing lotteries on in such a public way totally regardless of controlling powers? It is a huge breach of etiquette—and in a large city where folks were not so thoroughly known would find a harsher construction. A few were surprised into buying lottery numbers last Tuesday, but upon calm reflection—the public—who go to spend an agreeable evening at the sewing circle, will remain at home sooner than by their presence encourage a continuation of such a system of begging. The Tuesday evening meetings, at Odd Fellows' Hall, are universally pronounced most inviting, and in every way creditable to the ladies in charge as completion of quantities of useful work, and the assemblage of happy faces, and ring of merry voices testifies. But well wishes see that a warning voice in this instance would be but kind.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

Doctor Collyer, the chemist of the Agricultural Department, referring to the experiments which have been made in raising sugar from Indian corn and sorghum, says:

"It Congress will give me ten acres of ground to experiment on next season, I will return twenty tons of raw sorghum sugar, fully equal to the best raw cane sugar, or forfeit my reputation. That is two tons to the acre, and it is a much better result than they get on the average in Louisiana with the sugar cane." For example, "said Dr. Collyer, 'is worth about seventy-five millions annually. If they will devote one-tenth the acreage to sorghum of the variety best suited to the latitude they can raise sugar in amount equal to our whole annual importation, which is about \$100,000,000 worth, and even this will only equal fifty per cent. of the most favorable of any experiment. The secret," he continued, "now that the method of crystallization is understood, lies simply in the time to gather their crop, and in this respect my experiments are complete and conclusive."

"What is the total cost of production?" the Doctor was asked.

"Well, on that point I cannot speak so definitely, but I see no reason why it should exceed three cents a pound. Raw sugar now costs a fraction more than six cents a pound, but about forty-five per cent. of that is for duties. We can certainly raise sugar from sorghum much cheaper than we can buy it abroad."

An article in the *Republique Française* entirely confirms the belief in the early advent of Gambetta to power. The general opinion upon M. Waddington's speech is that it is a dignified and liberalization over the present Ministry.

A telegram confirms the previous report of a disaster to the Chilean forces to the mouth of Loa River. After a stubborn fight 1500 Chileans surrendered to the allies with all their cannons and ammunition. The Chilean commander was killed.

The *Daily News* Kabul despatch says the Governor of Maidon has been killed by Afghan regulars and bushmen, and the Governors of Kohistan and Logar Valley have been menaced with the same fate.

On Thursday last, at Bangor, a lad named James Tool met with a fearful death. He and a boy, James Sweeney, while playing near the E. & N. A. R. built a fire under a hanging ledge of rock. The ledge was dislodged by the heat, and fell, killing Tool instantly, and breaking Sweeney's leg in two places.

The number of Her Majesty's ships on the west coast of Africa will shortly be increased in consequence of the prevailing war there.

In a recent lecture on "Liquids" at the Royal Institution, London, Prof. Tyndall mentioned that he had satisfactorily ascertained that the throwing power of a steam engine would be reduced by a mere scratch in the nozzle of the delivery pipe, from 200 feet down to 150 feet.

Twelve thousand people called upon the King of Spain and his bride at their reception on Monday. The scene was incomparably brilliant.

The allied Peruvians and Bolivians were defeated at Tacapaca, Peru, by the Chilians, who have taken possession of the town. The Chilean squadron has blockaded Africa. Loss heavy on both sides.

It is stated the British and French consuls at the Island of Massana have summoned the King of Abyssinia to allow Gordon Pasha to return to Egypt without hindrance. It is reported that Prince Hassan, son of the Khedive, applied for a command in the expedition against Abyssinia.

## Telegraphic News.

DORCHESTER, N. B., Dec. 6.

Yesterday evening Timothy Allen Landry, son of Hon. P. A. Landry, aged 6 years, died of diphtheria, after a short illness. Mr. Landry's daughter has also just taken the disease, and much sympathy is felt for the parents, especially for Mr. Landry, who is absent in Ottawa. The sympathy of a wide number of friends is extended to the parents in their bereavement.

### Ireland.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

A loud meeting was held on Thursday at Nenagh, County Tipperary, at which 2000 were present. Edward Dwyer Gray and Patrick James Smith, Home Rule members of Parliament, were among the speakers. Resolutions were passed calling for abatement of rents and for peasant proprietorship.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.

Thomas Brennan, an employee of the Dublin City Bakery Company, a leading land agitator of the Land League, was arrested this morning, and conveyed to Castlebar, charged with using seditious language at Balla, and endeavoring to seduce the police from their allegiance.

#### THE N. B. DELEGATION.

RECALL OF HON. MR. LANDRY.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5th.

The New Brunswick delegation had an interview this morning with the Privy Council. It is understood they will leave for home on Monday.

Hon. Mr. Landry, of the New Brunswick delegation, left for home to-day, in consequence of the receipt of a telegram from the family physician, that two of his children were seriously ill with diphtheria.

### Cable Briefs.

It is untrue that there will be a conference of Russian Ambassadors at St. Petersburg.

The steamer "Anglia," from New York, Nov. 22nd, for Glasgow, stranded in a snow storm near Pladina, in the Frith of Clyde.

A Boston despatch states that a terrible accident occurred in a grain mill at Brockton, yesterday. The flooring gave way, precipitating three men into the clear, and five thousand bushels of corn fell upon them, smothering them to death.

The London *Daily News* correspondent at Fort Webster, South Africa, reports that the Boers still talk of resistance and that Secoceni shows no wish to make peace.

BE it enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton as follows:—  
No person shall, without permission from the Mayor or from the Road Surveyor, put or place, or cause or allow to be put or placed in, over or upon any of the open ditches or watercourses within the limits of the City of Fredericton, whether on private property, or where the same crosses any of the Public Streets or Highways, any manure, nightsoil, dirt, offal, or any rotten or offensive substance, or any broken glass, stone, bricks, rubbish, iron, bark, timber, lumber, slabs, or anything whatsoever, or any building or erection tending in any degree to impede the flow of the water, under a penalty not exceeding TWENTY DOLLARS, nor less than FIVE DOLLARS for each and every offence; and in case the owner of any such article, offensive substance, erection or impediment, or the person who may have so placed the same as aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse to remove the same forthwith, when directed so to do by the Road Surveyor, or any Peace Officer of the City, every person so offending shall for each and
