IVANHOE.

A moment of peril is often also a moment of openhearted kindness and affection. We are thrown off our guard by the general agitation of our feelings, and betray the intensity of those, which, at more tranquil periods, our prudence at least conceals, if it cannot altogether suppress them. In finding herself once more by the side of Ivanhoe, Rebecca was astonished at the keen sensation of pleasure which she experienced, even at a time when all around them was both as dangerous, if not despair. His war-horse—his hunting hound, are dearer to him than the despised Jewess!" "My mind, gentle maiden," continued Ivanhoe, "is more disturbed by anxiety, than my body with pain. From the speeches of these men who were my warders just now, I learn that I am a prisoner, and, if I judge aright of the loud hoarse voice which even now despatched them hence on some military duty, I am in the castle of Front-de-Bœuf. If so, how will this end, or how can I protect Rowena and my father?"

"He names not the Jew or Jewess," said Rebecca, internally, "yet what is our portion in, and how justly am I punished by heaven for letting my thoughts dwell on him." She hastened after this brief self-accusation to give Ivanhoe what information she could. But it was only this, that the Templar Bois-Guilbert, and the Baron Front-de-Bœuf, were commanders within the castle; that it was beleaguered from without, but by whom she knew not. She added that there was a Christian priest within the castle who might be possessed of more information.

"A Christian priest," exclaimed the knight joyfully; "fetch him hither, Rebecca, if thou canst—say a sick man desires his counsel—say what thou wilt, but bring him—I must do or attempt something, but how can I determine until I know how matters stand outside of the castle?" Rebecca, in compliance with the wishes of Ivanhoe, made that attempt to bring Cedric into the wounded knight's chamber, which was defeated as we have already seen by the interference of Urried, who had been also on the watch to intercept the supposed knight, and Rebecca retired to communicate to Ivanhoe the unfortunate result of her errand.

They had not much leisure to regret the failure of this source of intelligence, or to contrive by what means it might be supplied; for the noise within the castle, occasioned by the defensive preparations which had been considerable for a long time, now increased into ten-fold bustle and clamor. The heavy yet hasty step of the men-at-arms traversed the battlements or rounded on the narrow and winding stairs, which led to the various bartisans and points of defence. The voices of the knights were heard animating their followers or directing means of defence, while their commands were often drowned in the clashing of armor, or the clamorous shouts of those whom they addressed. Tremendous as these sounds were, and yet more terrible from the awful event which they presaged, there was a sublimity mixed with them, which Rebecca's high-toned mind could feel even in that moment of danger. Her eye kindled, although the blood fled from her cheeks; and there was a strong mixture of fear and a thrilling sense of the sublime, as she repeated, half whispering to herself, half speaking to her companion, the sacred text, "The quiver ratteth; the glittering spear and the shield; the noise of the captains and the shouting!"

But Ivanhoe was like the war-horse of that sublime passage, glowing with impatience at his idleness, and with an ardent desire to join in the fray of which these sounds were the introduction. "If I could but drag myself," he said, "to yonder window, to see how this brave fight is like to go—if I had but bow to shoot a shaft, or battle axe to strike were it but a single blow for our deliverance. It is in vain—I am aliee nerveless and weaponless."
