The Miramichi Drives.

LATEST NEWS FROM THE RIVER.

Knowing the peculiar interest which many of our readers have in the progress of the river drive on the S.W. Miramichi, we have been some pains to ascertain from reliable sources the state of affairs as regards this matter.

The drive on Bedell Brook, a large branch of the North Branch of S. W. Miramichi, 20 miles east of Grand Falls, has not yet been heard from.

The logs are all out of Burnt Hill Brook, Clearwater Stream, Rocky Brook, the Sisters and Lake Stream. The Green Head Drive is not quite out but is considered safe.

The Taxis drive which is large will be out in the Main S. W. by Monday night at the furthest.

Little Dugan drive owned by Justus Fairley, Esq., is in the boom, and the Big Dugan drive is below the Lower Falls and sure to come.

Owing to the high water at the commencement of river driving the logs were thrown out of the streams and left high on the banks which will necessitate a good deal of seeking to get them off.

Frederic Moore's drive 5,000,000 on Aroostook, Presque Isle is "hung up" without hope.

Maduxneque drives are coming out all right. We may say next to the Nashuaak the Maduxneque is the best lumber tributary of the St. John.

The Aroostook logs are nearly all out, and have been running past Fredericton the last two days.

REV MR MITCHELL BEFORE THE PRESBYTERIAN INQUIRERS.

We are quite ignorant of Presbyterian Church government, and therefore don't know how that august body tries its delinquent members.

Miraculous Escape from Drowning.

Four miles from the mouth of the Clearwater a large tributary of the Southwest Branch of the St. John, the river is very shallow, where the river pitches six feet at one leap and about twenty in the distance of fifty yards, and below this the gorge is not more than twenty feet wide.

On Tuesday last Mr. Henry Turnbull's drive had cleared these falls, and his two baggage skiffs with two men each, loaded with cooking utensils, food, tents and baggage, were dropped down by the river.

One of these (Andrew McAllister) who had been under water longer than any of the others, when he was dragged ashore was apparently dead, his eyes were closed and he was filled with sand. After a while he was brought to, and is now but little the worse of his adventure. The loss in the way of tents and baggage is very considerable.
