AGRICULTURAL MEETING.

The executive of the Provincial Farmers and Dairy-men's Association met in agricultural hall Friday morning. There were present Hon. C. H. Law, biliole, H. Montgomery, Campbell, W. S. Hubbard, John P. W. B. Fisher, E. H. Turnbull, R. C. Williams, G. Mowat, W. J. Webb, H. B. Hall and P. C. Powys. A programme for the annual meeting was arranged and it was decided to engage Dr. Geo. B. Mitchell of Maine and Dr. Robertson of the Maritime Experimental Farm to discuss the judging of thoroughbred cattle. Among the topics for consideration at the annual meeting are the production of pork for packing purposes, the business side of horse raising, dairy farm instruction, sheep raising, and the profits of co-operative versus private dairying. It was decided that an evening session be devoted to the advancement of agricul- tural.

This collar is an improvement upon the old style pneumatic collar, as it is furnished with a steel rim and new and improved valves. The collar is made so as to do away with any metal stitching, so that it is more perfectly fitting collar, which will not chafe or sore the horse. The firm has one of the finest exhibits of horse blankets of their own manufacture that can be seen anywhere, as well as lap rugs in all styles and patterns, suited to everyone. One of the show cases contains a glittering display of bits, 24 styles in all, from the ordinary to the most severe, some being new designs specially constructed for unruly horses. Horse boots of all kinds for the ankle, shin and knee are shown. The firm keeps in stock a full line of bells and mountings. Among other celebrated goods Horton & Son handle the well known Elemen's Embroos- ing boots for all kinds of horses. Whips, brushes, halters and pads are shown in profusion. As is known, the firm make a specialty of saddlery, and have on exhibition several hand- some specimens of ladies' and gentle- men's saddles. It will pay visitors to see this exhibit.
