

B. LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, March 31.—The debate on the address was resumed in the legislature this afternoon. Mr. Morrisey said he had listened with interest to the remarks of the attorney general and the member for Colchester. The claim was put forward that the government was returned to power because of its progressive policy, and in this connection mention was made of its agricultural policy and its encouragement of wheat raising in the county of Northumberland.

MR. GRIMMER said he regretted that he was unable to commend the speech of the attorney general, because he expected to have more aggressive statements from that gentleman. The member for Northumberland had stated facts which sit heavily in the bosom of the new government. In the election in Charlotte, the government had taken credit for what they had done in distributing wheat and turning spavins. Mr. King in Charlotte had planned to buy wheat which turned out very poorly. The sum of \$5,000 had been spent for agriculture. Of this amount \$3,000 had been paid in bonuses to butter and cheese factories and \$2,000 in farmers' societies, making a total of \$11,000. The commissioner had received in salary and expenses for himself and a clerk \$4,000, and the sum of \$5,000 had been paid to dairy superintendents. For expenses of farmers' and dairymen's association there had been paid \$1,000, for association there had been \$2,000, and for other services \$7,000, so that it cost the province for the report of agriculture for 1907, \$14,000. Taking into account the \$1,000 for the report of agriculture for 1906, and \$4,000 for other services which placed affairs as they existed in 1901 in an inevitable light. He was surprised to find that the speech from the throne did not contain any reference to the mining development of the province. Why is it that so many of the things which are allowed to be held under the regulations of the mining act being compiled with? In Charlotte five square miles were held by one man in St. Stephen since 1880, and has simply paid a nominal amount required to hold those leases.

Mr. Grimmer, in reply to Hon. Mr. Pugsley, said he referred to Frank Todd. Hon. Mr. Pugsley—It is not a fact that those areas are under the control of the mining act. Mr. Grimmer said he had obtained an option to consider of a royalty for the area of 7,000 acres which was being taken the government drill to Charlotte Co. under the agreement that the area would be renewed if the drill would work. Mr. Todd had the right to bore from seven to twenty feet a day in hard rock, but some days it only went down a few feet. When the drill was up Mr. Todd refused to give an option, and the surveyor general was appealed to. After two hearings the surveyor's statement was read in the petition and was proved to the satisfaction of the court. Mr. Todd had the right to assume his property was being drilled, but he refused to give an option to begin and carry on the work. Mr. Todd's own statement is that he does not intend to spend his own money in the mining, but he has a large amount of capital to be expended for that purpose.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY—Is it not the case during the period referred to your clients had under lease an option which prevented Mr. Todd from developing the property for development?

MR. GRIMMER said the lease which Mr. Todd holds compels him to work the property to the full extent of the mining act, and still he does not sink a shaft. He merely says that he will not develop the property himself but will induce foreign capitalists to do so. He has the assistance of federal funds. It was not run on local funds; nothing was discussed. The mining department on the record of the government's policy was not aggressive.
