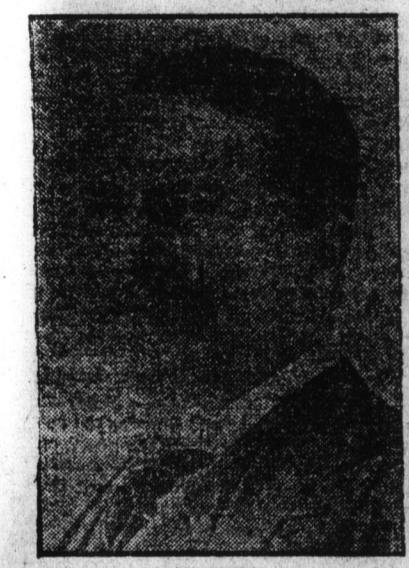

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Theodore Roosevelt of New York and Charles Warren Fairbanks of Indiana were today inaugurated respectively president and vice-president of the United States.

FIGHTING CONTINUED WITHOUT CESSATION.

It is Reported That Japanese Have Lost Thirty Thousand Men in Killed and Wounded—Kuropatkin's Danger.

There was no cessation of the fighting between the Russian and Japanese armies last night, according to Russian reports. It is reported that a distance of the tide of battle in the immediate vicinity of Mukden seemed to be ebbing.

VALLEY OF DEATH. The valley in front of the Russian position has become a valley of death since the debatable ground from which neither side can remove its dead.

WITH BREASTS TORN OPEN. Again and again the Japanese charged down the slope and up the hill. Again and again the Russians counter-attacked, trying to gain possession of "the hill with the tower."

JAPANESE ATTACK. At dawn yesterday the Japanese attacked the Russian positions near Oubunepusa. The attackers were scarce and mechanically did they not forward attack and with undying persistence attack and be thrown back.

TORONTO BAPTISTS.

Condemned School Clauses of the Autonomy Bill—A Liberal's Declaration.

TORONTO, March 6.—At a representative mass meeting of Toronto Baptists tonight a strong resolution protesting against the separate school clauses of the autonomy bill was carried. D. F. Thompson, K. C., a prominent liberal, declared the bill was repugnant to the policy of the Liberal party on the provincial rights. Had Sir Wilfrid made known his policy before the general election he would have been defeated by twenty majority. The bill, he said, was a surprise to the country.

BURGLARIES AT WOODSTOCK.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., March 6.—A store on King street, known as the I. K. L., run by Fred Snider, was broken into last night and quite a lot of stuff stolen, including watches and jewellery to the value of about \$75. The entrance was made through the rear of the building by removing glass in the window and unlocking the door from the inside. The burglars also entered the store of G. W. Vanwart, but nothing was taken. The police have their eyes on suspicious parties.

BODY CRUMBLER TO DUST.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Mar. 6.—One more body was recovered from the Virginia mine yesterday, which makes the total number of victims counted at present 108. The mine is still full of water and slow progress is being made in installing the pumping machinery. The body found was in a dry place and was well preserved by the gases in the mine, but fell to pieces on its being brought into the fresh air.
