SAYS HITTTITES WERE VERY STRICT ON MARRIAGE

MANY FACTS ARE DISCLOSED

College Professor Tells of Tribe Driven From Palestine by Israelites

Philadelphia, Feb. 15.—Translating a code of laws by Dr. George A. Barton, professor of Semitics at the University of Pennsylvania, is disclosing many facts about the Hitittes a tribe driven out of Palestine by the Israelites. The tablets of laws containing about 200 sections in all of which he 15 are missing from part of that made in 1906 by Prof. Herz Wecker in Cappadocia, Asia Minor. Prof. Barton's history formerly of Vienna published a French translation of the laws in 1921 but this was deemed inadequate and Dr. Barton undertook to do the work from the original.

The tablets, declared Dr. Barton today were probably written between 1750 and 1250 B. C. during the reign of Sargon and his successor, Merhul. His researches he said prove the existence of the Hitittes in the common pools with Greek and Latin. "The Hitittes" said Dr. Barton, were an agricultural people who had made from the king or from cities with certain feudal obligations. "They seem to have been a people great to conquer. "The laws deal with almost every sort of offence—assault and battery, separation of wife and husband and breaking engagements. Dock Laborers in the Old Country Threaten To Tie up Every Port

Shipping Companies Working Today With Feverish Haste to Clear Cargoes Before the Blow Falls—Headlock Has Existed Since February 1st—Little Hope of Settlement.

(By Percy M. Sarl, British United Press Staff Correspondent) LONDON, February 15.—One million dock workers prepared today to quit work tomorrow and tie up every port in the United Kingdom, unless a last minute settlement cancels the strike orders.

Scenes at the huge docks of the port of London at daybreak were of unprecedented activity as shipping companies speeded efforts to clear cargoes before the impending paralysis of transport should set in.

CONFERENCE BEING HELD

Dockworkers, executives and employers were in conference seeking to break the deadlock that has existed since February 1. The threatened strike is national in scope. It was voted at a meeting of national delegates representing the Transport and General Workers Union (200,000) members, the National Union of General Workers (443,000), the National Amalgamated Union of Labor (470,000) United Order of General Laborers (500,000), the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, Marine and Electricians, etc. (40,000) and other similar organizations. The main complaint is that wages since 1920 have fallen from 16 shillings a day in the large ports and 15 shillings a day in the small ports to ten shillings and nine shillings respectively.

They ask revision to the former rates and a guarantee week in the larger British ports today there are more workers than jobs. Consequently the men line up at dawn and a foreman picks in order the number he needs for the day.

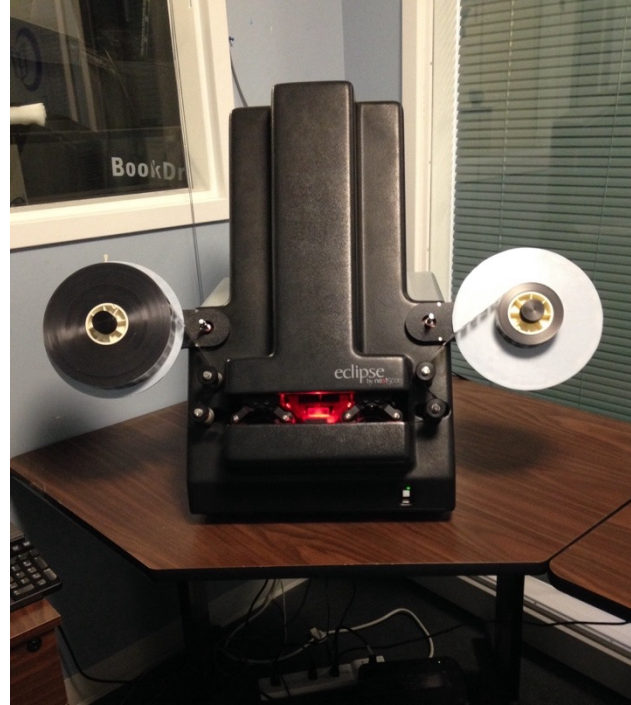

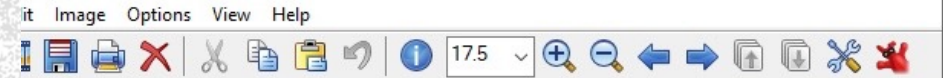

Steps:

- Issue Discovery
- Page OCR
- Issue Creation, Page Ingest
- DZI Tile Generation
- Issue Audit

1. ISSUE DISCOVERY, OCR QUEUEING

- Search path for all subfolders that contain a metadata file
- Search for all images in that folder and consider them to be each a page from that issue.
- Check if each image has an associated tesseract .hocr file generated. If not, the image is queued for OCR with Tesseract in a later step.
 - This is done to optimize core usage - some issues have a small number of pages
- Convert the metadata to JSON format for assertion to the Drupal REST API.



2. PAGE OCR

- Tesseract 5.x, run in Docker
 - <https://github.com/unb-libraries/docker-tesseract>
- Operates on all queued images to generate OCR for each page.
- No issue creation is done in the REST API until all issues have OCR complete.



3. ISSUE CREATION, PAGE INGEST

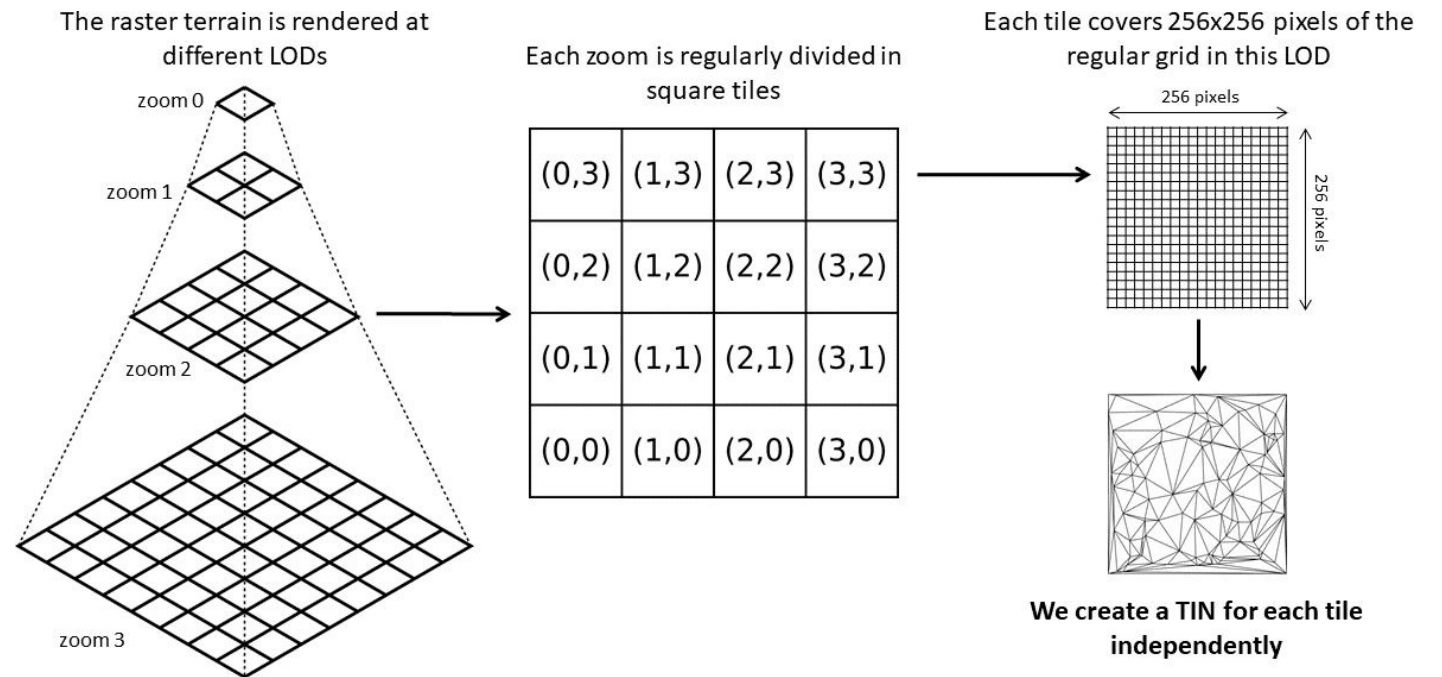
Once OCR is complete:

- Iterate over folders and create each an issue by POSTing to the Drupal REST API
- Create the pages and attach to the issue (via the REST API)
- Add OCR output to page
- Writes a marker file inside the subfolder to indicate the issue has been ingested



4. DZI TILE GENERATION

- Page viewer, OpenSeadragon, can leverage a set of 'tiles' to minimize the bandwidth for zooming.
- These tiles are then generated.



5. ISSUE AUDIT

- Audits all issues in the import
 - Verifies metadata
 - Hashes page files and compares to local
 - Checks page numbering

Philadelphia, March 9.—Despite the excitement created by the "shooting up" of Frankford avenue, one of the principal thoroughfares in the north-eastern section of the city late last night by a trolley car load of alleged St. Louis strike bearers there were no serious demonstrations against pany.
